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

# **Grand Design: An interview with Steve Grand**

What's the first thing that comes to mind when you think of gay singer/ songwriter turned fashion designer Steve Grand? Some folks will undoubtedly answer his breakout hit single, "All American Boy," and the accompanying video. Both were significant in that the song was an unabashedly queer country tune with visuals to match. Of course, it didn't hurt that Grand was model-handsome and had a flawless body on display. So far, we have his singing voice, songwriting chops, and impressive looks and physique. It's that gym body, and his own personal interest in the kinds of garments that show them off, that has led him to create his Grand Axis (shopGrandAxis.com) clothing line, featuring men's underwear and swimwear. Steve was kind enough to make time for an interview, and after you finish reading it, you'll want to follow him on his socials: @GrandAxis (Instagram), @GrandAxis (TikTok), and @Grand\_Axis (Twitter). You won't be disappointed.

Gregg Shapiro: Since the release of your debut single in 2013, the country-oriented "All American Boy," several other male country artists, including Ty Herndon, Billy Gilman, Orville Peck, and TJ Osborne have come out as gay. Do you feel that your being an out musician had anything to do with that?

Steve Grand: I think, more than anything, it had to do with the major cultural shift that was happening across this country. According to the Gallup polls, public support for gay marriage went from 40 percent approval in May 2009, to 60 percent approval in May 2015. Gay marriage was a big topic of discussion in the early 2010s for a lot of reasons. You

had artists like (Lady) Gaga frequently talking about her gay fans, you had gay characters coming out in TV shows; you had the repeal of "Don't Ask Don't Tell" in 2011, and then Obergefell in 2015. I think the internet, and the rise of social media had more to do with it than anything. Before social media. corporate press and big movie and TV studios drove the narrative on these sorts of things. And because they are beholden to advertisers

which are more conservative and risk-averse, they would often avoid even acknowledging LGBTQ+ people for fear it would upset large sections of the country. But I think social media gave regular people an opportunity to be their authentic selves. And it gave artists/content creators like me the ability to make music and videos that could be seen by millions without needing the backing of a big record label.

GS: Almost 10 years ago, in 2015, you released your full-length debut album "All American Boy." When you look back on that time, how would you describe it?



SG: It was a whirlwind. I remember being cognizant of the fact that it was all moving fast and that I needed to make a conscious effort to stop and take in all the cool, special, unique experiences I was having. Looking back, I don't think I listened to that voice inside me enough. I always felt like my best days were ahead; that my moment had yet to come, and that I just needed to hunker down and keep working. And, unfortunately, that often kept me from embracing the present moment.

It's funny, my best memories of that time end up being all the times in between, like the road trips with my tour manager and whatever

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members of the band I was traveling with. I was always thinking about what I needed to be doing better or focused on the show, but it is those conversations on the road when we were tired, hungover, and stressing about where we needed to be, traveling from one venue to the next, that I remember most fondly.

## GS: What kind of music are you listening to for enjoyment these days?

SG: I am loving the new Billie Eilish record. And the country record Post Malone just made. I continue to appreciate him more and more. Whenever I see him in interviews I am just so impressed with how centered and genuine he is; how he seems to know exactly who he is. There is a real depth and a goodness in him, and I think that really comes through in his voice.

# GS: Am I remembering correctly that for a while, you left Chicago for LA? If that's correct, what was that experience like for you?

SG: I spent some time in LA while I was making my first record. I stayed with a friend of a friend. Funny enough, I had never met them before the day I showed up at their door with my bags. It was on my 24th birthday. They gave and gave to me and never expected anything in return. I don't think I ever went out and did any nightlife there. The friends I stayed with had a large group of friends and threw a lot of parties and events, so I really benefited from having their sort of built-in group of guys to hang out with when I stayed out there.

### GS: How long have you been back in Chicago?

**SG:** Other than the several months I've spent in LA, my summers in Ptown, and winters in Puerto Vallarta, I've been in the Chicago area the whole time.

GS: What do you like best about being in Chicago?

SG: The lakefront in the summer. The fact that the crumby winters are something we all endure together, which means we also experience the beauty and aliveness of the spring and summer together. The winters are so cold and dead, but it makes you appreciate the beautiful weather in the summer, and all the plant life



that comes back to life. The whole city comes alive when it starts getting nice. Everyone's mood is lifted and there is a real sense that we need to make the most of the summer because it's fleeting. I also love the people. Chicago is not as transient as cities like LA and New York where most people are not from there. Most Chicagoans have roots here. And people are genuinely nice and kind.

GS: In 2019, you launched Grand Axis, a clothing line designed by you that includes underwear, swimwear, shorts, socks, t-shirts, and hats. How did you come up with the name Grand Axis?

SG: I was about two weeks from going into production with the name "Grand." I stupidly assumed I could use it because it was my name, but decided I should hire a trademark

attorney just to be sure. I was told there were about 200 other companies that could have a copyright infringement claim, so I needed to come up with a name very quickly. I used word generators and all sorts of other methods of coming up with names. I went with "Axis" because I just like how it sounded together; I thought the word "Axis" was very strong, and I liked that it had the letter X in it which just looks cool and strong.

GS: Was designing this kind of clothing a lifelong passion of yours, or was it something you stumbled upon and decided to run with it?

SG: Like a lot of gay men, I had my sexual awakening in the men's underwear aisle at our local department store [laughs]. And personally, I've always found an









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attractive guy in a speedo, briefs, or jockstrap even more sexy than seeing him naked. Even when I was a college student working a \$10 an

hour job and didn't even have many regular clothes, I was buying more of this attire for myself than anything else. I started to get very fixated on the design and fit. I didn't know how to sew. but I learned enough to make basic alterations to design and fit. Then I found some sites that made custom pieces. I began drawing my own patterns and having them sewn up. When I posted them on Instagram, I'd get lots of guys asking where they could buy them. And at that point I decided I should just produce them en masse. I thought it would be a side gig. I had no idea all that was involved. I think if I knew how hard it would be I may not have started it [laughs]! So, my ignorance kind of worked out to my benefit, because now I am deep in it and I'm happy I made it all

### GS: What's the most rewarding part of Grand Axis?

work. So far at

least.

SG: Going to the beach and seeing guys I don't even know wearing my brand! It is so rewarding to see guys

enjoying and looking great in something I spent hundreds of hours obsessing over every detail. That makes it all so worth it.

GS: What's the most challenging part?

**SG:** A few things: Delegating. Dealing with factories to get them to make the pieces exactly how I want. Always having to make decisions



about every aspect of the products and the business. The stress of wiring tens of thousands of dollars of my own money before I see any product. At the end of the day, if the factory goes under, you really don't have any recourse. I've heard horror

stories from other brands.

GS: You shared your recent pec tear workout injury, as well as

> your recovery, on social media. Are you fully back to 100 percent or still taking it easy?

**SG:** I am very grateful to be able to say recovery has been easy and painless. I had an excellent surgeon. The first surgeon I saw said it could not be repaired so I am very glad I got a second opinion! The worst part has been not being able to move much weight with it. There are so many exercises I can't do, I'm afraid to say I have only had a handful of workouts in the last 10 weeks. I will be 75 percent healed at 12 weeks. but it will still be a few months before I can lift heavy. But in the scheme of things, I am just grateful I had a problem that could be fixed!

**GS: Your second** album, "Not The End of Me" was released in 2018. Because most people came to know you as a singer/songwriter first. I'd be remiss if I didn't ask if there was more music from you in the works.

SG: I still will write music, but most songs are incomplete. I wish I could say I had another record ready to go, but when the pandemic happened and I

wasn't able to perform and lost 90 percent of my income that year, I had to make Grand-Axis my full-time job to pay the bills. And now that it has, I struggle to find the time and creative energy to make that happen. But I am still hopeful I will get back to it one of these days.

### Matteo matters: An interview with gay comedian Matteo Lane

When it comes to comedy, everyone has their own ideas about what is or isn't funny. Things that make you laugh might have the opposite effect on someone else. In the ongoing evolution of stand-up comedy, the presence of LGBTQ+ comics continues to increase at a fast pace. While lesbian comedians have long dominated, gay male comics are making their presence felt, with Matteo Lane being, far and away, the best. Lane, who combines Midwestern and European influences in his material, has a distinctive delivery style that often has audience members struggling to catch their breath between jokes and laughs. It also helps that he's easy on the eyes, very handsome with a hot gym body! Matteo was kind enough to make time for an interview in advance of his upcoming comedy tour. [Matteo Lane performs at the Pabst Theater in Milwaukee 10/10.]

Gregg Shapiro: Matteo, I had the pleasure of interviewing you for the first time in 2017 in advance of your performance at the Dania Beach Casino.

Matteo Lane: I think I remember that. I wasn't headlining, right? Was I opening for someone else?

GS: Someone else who was not very funny.

**ML:** OK, now I remember, Sam Jay and I were both opening for... [laughs] yeah, I remember that.

GS: Since then, your social media and online presence have increased greatly. How important is it to you to maintain that?

**ML:** I don't know that I think about it in terms of maintaining it so much as it's nice to reach out and have

people reach back. It's also a great way of letting people know that I'm on tour, so they get to see what I work on all the time, which is stand-up. I don't think I've ever thought about it that way, as maintaining. I just think of it more as a great opportunity to express yourself and have people enjoy it.

GS: Your

conversations with comedians are inspired and hilarious, and the ones with Jessica Kirson are a particular favorite of mine.

ML: | love Jessica|

GS: That face! Are you having as much fun as you appear to be having?

*ML:* [Laughs] Yes! What do you take me for? I wouldn't be doing it if I wasn't enjoying it [laughs]. It's not like it's MGM in 1935 and I have to pretend with Mickey Rooney that I'm having a good time. I'm choosing to do this!

GS: Speaking of Mickey Rooney, do you know if Liza Minnelli is aware of your impression of her? ML: I don't know. But I feel like I've been getting closer [laughs]. Now I'm at the point where I know close friends of hers. I don't even think she would be offended if she heard it. I think she's got tough skin. I think she would laugh, and probably ask me what I wanted for dinner. She seems nice. She has a memoir


coming out, and at least 10 people texted me yesterday saying that I should do the audiobook.

GS: The way the audience becomes part of your shows has become something of a trademark of yours.

ML: They actually haven't. It's a big misconception. It takes a really long time to write material. I do about 20 shows a week at The Comedy Cellar in New York, strictly working on material that I've been writing. Twice a year, just two times a year, I record my advice special where I just talk to the audience because it's fun and it is a skill that I have. But it allows me to also use that in place of material that I need to build for a special in the meantime. When you come to see me live in a giant theater, I don't do any talking to the audience. It's all well-prepared, wellwritten material. It is a bit of a misconception. I understand where people would get that impression.



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Probably 11 months out of the year I'm consistently working on new jokes, crafting them, redoing them, practicing them over and over until they're ready for the road. When I'm on the road. I practice them

and practice them until it's ready for a special so that it's a fully ready, well-written special. I only do crowd work literally twice a year.

GS: Your cooking videos continue to be as informative as they are entertaining. Could you foresee doing a cooking show on the Food Network or the Cooking Channel?

**ML:** I feel like at this point they would have asked me. It's always so strange when people see a special night on YouTube and they'll say, "Next time, Netflix!" I'm like, "But you're watching it right now, so what's the difference?" If I'm on the Food Network or YouTube, isn't it the same thing [laughs]? It's all an excuse to be funny. The cooking is secondary because I'm using it as an excuse to be very comedy driven. The benefit of not doing it for someone like the Food Network is I get to have full control and air it the way I like it.

**GS:** You own it. *ML:* Yes. I guess it does look more official if it's on the Food Network, but I don't know, I'm enjoying it.

GS: I went to Emerson
College in Boston, and I
lived in the North End,
kitty-corner from Bova's
Bakery, which at the time
was open 24-hours. Did
you have chance to stop
in there when you were in the
North End shooting that video, or
did you only go to Mike's Pastry
on Hanover Street?

**ML:** We went to Mike's Pastry because everyone's like, "If you want cannoli, you've got to go to Mike's. I went in with my friend

Francesco (De Carlo) from Rome and my friend Amina Imani. They were speaking Italian to us; they gave us the cannoli for free. They were so sweet about it. It was a



great experience. It's a nice little street in Boston. I enjoyed it.

GS: The Asia and Chris DeBurgh tour t-shirt you're wearing in the wonderful cooking video with your mom and your aunt made me wonder who are some of your favorite musical acts?

**ML:** I promise you those shirts I wear, I wear them just because they fit well [laughs]. Someone was like, "Are you a huge AC/DC fan?" I go,

"What? No, I listen to Bill
Evans Trio and Maria
Callas." If it fits well, that's
all I care about. I didn't
even know what was on
the shirt, to be honest with
you. I guess I should pay
more attention to it.

GS: What can you tell the readers about your colorful ink which is very visible in that video?

ML: I have three tattoos now, all of which I've designed. One is Maria Callas, one is Poison Ivy from "Batman," and the other side is Storm from "X-Men: The Animated Series."

GS: You are also known for your shopping videos, such as the ones at Trader Joe's and Mall of America. Do you enjoy in-person shopping as much as you enjoy poking fun at it, or would you rather make all your purchases online? **ML:** I'm on a plane and in hotels most of my life. So, when I'm home in New York, the last thing I want to do is go shopping. Sometimes I'll go to thrift stores if I'm on the road. A comedian friend of mine and I will go to thrift stores. Usually, I'll just order online. I don't have that much stuff. Besides furniture that I've ordered online, it's basically groceries and that's about

GS: Do you think you might have a cookbook or memoir, or a combination of both, in you?

**ML:** I think that's definitely possible in the future.

GS: When you do a hometown show in Chicago, what do you like best about it?

ML: When I go home to Chicago, it's


great, because all 31 of my cousins come to the show. I get to go to my Aunt Cindy's house for Sunday sauce. It's always a good time. I go see my grandparents. By the way, I talk to them every day. It's not like it's some family reunion. I talk to them all the time, but it's always nice to go home to Chicago and see my family.

GS: You're going to be performing at the Broward Center in Fort Lauderdale in September. Our deplorable governor has gone out of his way to make life difficult for the LGBTQ+ community here. Is there anything you would like to say to him?

**ML:** I think he needs to mind his own business. I think we can take that night as a great celebration of how strong our community is. Let's just use this as an opportunity to show how strong we are and how we can also laugh at ourselves and have a good time. We can still celebrate life in the face of adversity.

# **URGE Miami Festival Returns Thanksgiving Weekend**

URGE Miami Festival returns this Thanksgiving weekend with three massive nighttime events and two sizzling daytime fetes including the Royal Palm Pool Party and the legendary Beach Party on the sands of South Beach. The LGBTQ+ festival weekend will take place November 29-December 2 and will feature a list of the world's most famous circuit DJs playing at the city's most prestigious venues. "URGE is not only a music festival," says one the event's producers, *Luis* 

Morera. "Throughout the years, it has become a place where friends, old and new, meet up to celebrate gratitude. URGE offers a space like no other where everyone has the freedom to express themselves while dancing to the sounds of the greatest DJs of our time."

URGE Miami Festival kicks off Friday, November 29 at 10pm with the Miami premiere of GUAPO, a Sao Paulo, Brazil-based festival brand that has become worldrenowned for its happy and fresh vibe. The event will take place at M3 Studios, a venue that has hosted performances by artists like Shakira and Maluma. Even Beyonce recorded scenes for her music video at M3! GUAPO's producers are promising a level of production that has not been seen before in Miami. It will showcase the sounds of GUAPO's resident DJ Adham, along with Brazilian DJ Liza Rodriguez and - no stranger to the URGE brand - Mexico DJ Jesus Montanez.

The Saturday pool party will take place at the weekend's host hotel, The Royal Palm South Beach. The annual bash is one of URGE Festivals' most anticipated events. "Patrons love to dance under the Miami sun with the flexibility and comfort of being just a few steps from their hotel room," Raul Griffith comments, one of the festival producers. The DJs spinning

The revelry continues Saturday night with URGE Miami Festival's main event at M3 studios. "We'll be celebrating the brand's 13th birthday," Morera says. "I won't spoil the surprise. You must come and witness the magic!" Edu Quintas will make his triumphant return to the URGE booth, direct from the energetic Brazilian metropolis, Rio de Janeiro. He will be joined by world renowned Israeli DJ/ Producer *Mor Abrahami* and Miami's own DJ/Producer *YORDI*.

This year's Beach Party will be very different from year's past. "We are taking a very different approach to this year's beach bash, bringing an innovative look and higher level of production," says Morera. DJ/Producer Joe Gauthreaux will headline alongside international

### Portland East: Bike Heaven, Rich in History, 95 Neighborhoods to Explore, Your Vacation in Amazing Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania will surprise you. The city is set on numerous hills as well as at the confluence of three rivers in southwestern Pennsylvania. Its hipster vibrant scene is reminiscent of more popular (but less affordable) Portland, Oregon. It is a young scene due to the universities (Carnegie Mellon, Chatham, University of Pittsburgh, and more). It has a small town feel although it is a big city. And in rich in history including the steel making days where it was dubbed "Hell with the Lid Off" due to the pollution from the mills. Andrew Salk's polio vaccine was invented here as weas Westinghouse's development of electrical machines.

The economy – once dominated by the steel industry – is now a health care and technology hub.

LGBTQ+ visitors will enjoy all this plus the fun nightlife at the five-six bars scattered around the city.

### **WHAT TO DO**

Make your first stop the Heinz History Museum (across the street from the Hampton Inn in the Strip District). You will learn how we almost became a French speaking nation after George Washington surrendered to the French in the French Indian War. And of course about the 57 varieties of Heinz products (from pickles to ketchup). Details at *heinzhistorycenter.org*.

We took a two-hour historical walking tour with Ken of Bike the Burgh Tours (biketheburgh.com) who gives a history of the city plus a tour of key buildings including my favorite, the PPG Buildings (four buildings and a tower). You can also rent a bike and ride all the way to D.C. on the C&O trail with drop offs in Cumberland, MD and D.C. Book your two-hour historical walking tour at walktheburgh.com or by calling 412-246-9494. You will find them at 1049 Penn Avenue downtown, just a few blocks from the Hampton.

The Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens are another must. Chihuly glass combined with floral displays, tropical gardens, and more make this an incredible visit. Details at Phipps.conservatory.org.

Take a Rivers of Steel Tours of the former Carrie Blast Furnace. We took a two-hour tour the site which used a smelting process to make iron. We also stopped by the Bost Building, site of the Homestead lockout and strike. The nearby waterfront features a bike and hike trail that runs to Pittsburgh as well as shops and restaurants.

Walk over the bridges downtown to the Andy Warhol Museum on the North Shore, the most comprehensive single artist museum in the world. The provocative museum highlights the multi-talented LGBTQ+ colorful life (artwork, videos, films, magazines). Made famous using Campbell Soup Cans as artwork (and the Studio 54 1970s New York City disco scene), the artist was born and grew up in Pittsburgh before moving to New York. (Warhol.org, 117 Sandusky).

Tour the Frick Pittsburgh which includes an Art Museum, the Clayton Car and Carriage Museum, and the historic home (the Clayton Home) where the Frick family lived. Learn about the steel magnate's controversial history (he told Andrew Carnegie he would meet him in hell although the two were business partners who ran the steel industry in an anti-labor fashion for years). We took the "Gilded Not Golden" signature tour. The Gilded Age featured labor strife, industrialization, and more. The grounds alone are beautiful and worth a visit. Details at friskmuseum.org.

Take the Monongahela Incline up the hill to historic neighborhoods. Enjoy the breathtaking views of the city from the hilltop.

Explore Point State Park downtown where three rivers come together.

### **NIGHTLIFE**

They don't call it the Strip District for nothing. The Real Luck Café at

1519 Pennsylvania Avenue features a dive bar on the first floor and dancers on the second. The owner said no to gentrification, so the building stands alone on a lot awaiting development.

The 5801 Video Lounge and Café (5801 Ellsworth Avenue in the Shadyside neighborhood) has a fun trivia night on Tuesdays. The bar features indoor and outdoor seating. They could lose the \$13 wine price, though, as well as requiring holding your credit card to place an order. They also have a full menu. The Mexican quesadillas were particularly good. The bar features outdoor seating as well as an enclosed patio. A fun, cute crowd characterizes this iconic video bar and restaurant.

The Blue Moon at 5115 Butler is in an eclectic neighborhood of unique and independent shops and restaurants. No chain stores or fast food here. It features a fun happy hour and good pizza. It is in the funky Lawrenceville neighborhood. Check out the Hippie and French Cannabis Boutique.

The Brewers Hotel and Bar at 3315 Liberty is a fun dive bar with a long running happy hour. \$4 for a glass of wine plus a chatty crowd and cute bartender.

**WHERE TO STAY** 

We stayed at the Hampton Inn and Suites by Hilton Pittsburgh-Downtown (1247 Smallman Street). It's walkable to all the attractions (Riverfront Trail, Terminal District (Food Court), Lucky Café Bar, Club Pittsburgh, Warhol Museum, and more). We had a guiet room on the second floor facing the river. Their store has late-night snacks and alcohol. Rooms were clean and quiet although you had to ask nicely to have them cleaned daily. (Each hotel in America now has its own cleaning protocol. Always inquire, although the Hampton had a confusing set of rules on when they would do a "refresh" and when they would do a "cleaning.") The parking was free - unheard of at a downtown hotel. Other nearby hotels include the Homewood Suites and the AC Hotel. The Omni William Penn is a historic gem and another option.

### WHERE TO EAT

The nearby Terminal District is a food hall that was formerly a produce distribution center. Enjoy a fresh carrot juice at Playa Bowls (1707 Smallman Street). The Novo Asian Food Hall looked appetizing. Nearby you can have an original Pittsburgh sandwich at Primanti Bros. Served on oversized white bread, the sandwich features coleslaw, meat, and French fries for just \$10. It's a tradition.

### **INSIDER TIPS**

Pittsburghers (aka yinzers) have their own slang and dialect. A gumband is a rubber band. A jagoff is a jerk. A pop is a soft drink. A sweeper is a vacuum. You warsh your clothes. And yinz means y'all. The roots of Pittsburghers and their dialect from its Scottish, Irish, German and Slavicspeaking roots.

VisitPittsurgh.com has an LGBTQ + section to help you plan your trip.

**QBurgh.com** is the online LGBTQ "publication." Lots of ideas and current events can be found.

There is too much to do in Pittsburgh. We were there for a week and did not see all the attractions (including missing the Carnegie Museums). We will be back.

Inspired by the artist's own experiences with social media and the way it often favors superficiality over substance, the song taps into feelings of being overlooked. "I remember feeling so frustrated that my half-naked picture was gaining more attention than my music," CERANDA, who is opening for Katy Perry this Fall, recalls. "This song is about embracing who you are and knowing that you are 'that' girl-unapologetically confident and completely in control."

### Shane Gallagher: We love that you're bringing anthems back to the dance floor!

CERANDA: I grew up on Britney, Lady Gaga, Kesha and Rihanna and they were all about high energy party sounds that made me feel alive. I love a big overproduced sound. My goal with my music is to make people dance, have fun, escape reality, find confidence, get revenge on an ex, and let go.

### SG: "Do I Have Your Attention" reflects on your experiences with social media.

**CERANDA**: I get frustrated when I post an Instagram story in a bikini and receive a ton of views but then post a story about my music, and get considerably less. Recently, I decided to get c-nty and post bikini pictures with a link titled "OnlyFans"—except the link actually led to Spotify to stream my debut

S.G: So, when you're asking for attention, it's really for your music that you want people to notice? **CERANDA**: Definitely music first but come on, who doesn't love attention?

S.G: Tell us about how you found your way in the music industry. CERANDA: | grew up playing music with my dad. I went to college and studied classical voice, piano, and music business, and worked for

Live Nation.

After college, I worked for Youtube Music as a data analyst and started writing songs on the side. I found the more my love grew for making pop music, the less I cared about working in the industry. I am still involved in the music industry but in a very different way now.

S.G: Who are your inspirations? CERANDA: Hannah Montana! She wasn't just a pop star; she was a normal kid who played music with her dad, just like me. Also, she was from a small town in the middle of nowhere, Texas, and I could relate. Her show opened my eyes to what I imagined life could be like.

### S.G: Were you always confident and completely in control?

CERANDA: (Laughing) Hell no! I faked it 'til I made it. The reality is, the world does everything it can to strip us of our confidence. My songs

are a reminder to myself and to everyone else of who we are and what we're capable of. And honestly, the more you listen to the songs, the more you get it.

### S.G: How does your next single, "Superpowers" continue the theme of empowerment?

CERANDA: "Superpowers" is such a fun song. It's meant to be a breakup cure. Breakups are tough, no doubt about it, but something incredible happens when you finally get over it. It's like a new light starts shining from within—a real glow-up. It's a powerful feeling. I knew I had to write a song that captured that vibe and helps listeners fast-forward to the good part a little quicker.



# Premarital Agreements – Protect Your Property Rights

Q: My partner and I are planning on buying a house together, combining our finances and getting married at City Hall. We are madly in love and I know we are meant to be together forever. What kinds of things should we be thinking about to protect and resolve some of the financial and property issues we may face – just in case. Do you have any suggestions?

A: Illinois LGBT couples are now able to apply for a marriage license, get married the following day and enjoy all the benefits and legal obligations that married spouses have enjoyed for years. Although madly in love today, divorce lawyers know that love does not conquer all and that love can sour and turn to conflict. In the world of heterosexual marriage, there is an established history of divorce terms, experience with breakup rights and duties that are different from the rules that LGBT couples have lived by.

Divorce clients know the trials

and tribulations of a best friend's divorce, the property settlement they got, what their lawyer could or could not do for them and their responsibilities for payment of maintenance and child support. Unfortunately, these rules are new to LGBT couples planning marriage. They are important and everyone who plans to "tie the knot" should be aware of them.

Whatever you thought was your sole property before marriage changes. When married, spouses have rights to the martial property of the couple. Marital property is any property acquired by the parties during their marriage except for property which is specifically excluded as non-martial property. The burden is on the party claiming non-marital property to prove it.

If you get married, and split from your spouse, you may have to pay for maintenance. The amount and duration of maintenance is determined based upon relevant factors including age, income and property of each party, education, length of the marriage, whether the

recipient's ability to earn income has been impaired due to absence from the workforce to attend to domestic duties, and lifestyle of the parties.

If you divorce, you may have to pay attorneys' fees for yourself and you may have to pay the legal fees of your spouse. The law says that attorney's fees are the primary responsibility of the party incurring fees. However, if your spouse does not have any money, you may be required to pay his/her fees. Contribution of attorneys' fees from one party to the other is available where the payment of attorneys' fees would undermine a partner's economic stability.



Illinois is an equitable distribution state which means property is not necessarily divided 50/50 – there is no guarantee that either spouse will get half. The court considers relevant factors in determining how assets are to be divided, such as length of the marriage, age, health and employability of the spouses, contribution, both financial and nonfinancial, to the acquisition of property, the parties' respective abilities to generate capital assets in the future and other factors.

And if you die, your spouse has legal rights to certain retirement accounts you have regardless of who you named as the beneficiary.


Instead of letting a judge decide these issues in case you divorce, you should have a Premarital Agreement to establish your own financial agreements. Premarital Agreements clarify the rights and expectations in the marriage and can reduce the expenses and stress in a divorce by eliminating the issues to be determined.

Premarital Agreements must be in writing and signed by both parties. They must be entered into freely and voluntarily. And they require fair and reasonable financial disclosures. They also require each spouse to have their own attorney represent them and be signed well before the marriage so no claim can be made that the Agreement was forced onto one of the spouses.

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his helper in tying and tormenting Johnny. Since Johnny is so sweet, it made it so much sexier to do bad things to him.

### P.H: Is there anything you want to try in an upcoming film that you haven't experienced yet?

C.C: I would love to do something with electro... it's one of my biggest kinks and it's not very common. I think that my doing it on film might help open more people up to exploring the kink for themselves!

### P.H: What misconceptions do you think people have about fetish films and the performers in them?

C.C: There is some talk in the industry that those who do fetish films are freaks. I find that really disheartening and odd, too, especially when the someone saying negative shit about your kinks has videos on "X" of them taking a 13inch Brazilian dick. How does that make sense?

### P.H:What are your future goals?


C.C: I would say my future goals are an ever outwardly expanding thought process. I don't have one particular goal, just to live the best version of my kinky self.

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




# GRAB A BOOK

"Spirit Crossing" by William Kent Krueger c.2024, Atria \$28.99 336 pages



Your usual chair at the table is unoccupied.

Down the hall, your bed's still made; the blankets, straight. The noises you make, the scent of you, it's all gone, missing from the places you should be. Will you return soon? Only you can be sure but, as in the new novel "Spirit Crossing" by William Kent Krueger, there are people hoping you will.

Annie O'Connor hadn't wanted to come back home for anything but the family wedding that was a month away. She hadn't wanted to leave Guatemala, though she spoke to her partner, Maria, about home in many warm ways. She wasn't afraid that she'd encounter problems for being what the Anishinaabe called "Two-Spirits," because her family was open and loving. No, Annie had another secret, and she didn't know if she'd have time to tell it.

Like a lot of seven-year-olds, Corcoran O'Connor's grandson, Waaboo (Ojibwenowin for "Little Rabbit") was curious, active, and smart. Unlike his contemporaries, however, Little Rabbit knew the spirit world, and so when he seemed to speak to spirits in the woods one afternoon, his grandfather paid attention – and Cork made a grisly discovery.

Daniel English, O'Connor's son-inlaw and Waboo's father, worked as a tribal police officer and he'd been talking angrily about the large number of Native American girls who'd gone missing in northern Minnesota, and how the local police did little about it.

Case in point: the young woman who lay in a shallow grave in a blueberry patch.

Daniel believed – hoped – she was one of the Lakota girls he'd been searching for.

But Waboo said there were two girls whose spirits were lost. Was the other spirit that of Olivia Hamilton, a white girl whose father had money, and who the police were trying hard to find? Why were young women disappearing without a trace in northern Minnesota? And, as the county and tribal police got closer to a killer, why would someone want to murder a little boy who saw people that others could not see?


It's been a long summer, and you've missed Cork O'Connor, haven't you? Yep, so you're good and ready for another installment, and "Spirit Crossing" will make you very happy.

As you've come to expect, author William Kent Krueger pulls readers into this novel in his O'Connor series quick and easy, with characters you can't help but get involved with – including some of Krueger fans' old favorites, some recent favorites in new plotlines, and new folks you'll really want to get to know. It's like attending your hometown's small-town festival and running into new friends and people you've known for years but haven't seen in awhile. You're happy to have a cold one with some of them.

Others, big jerks and troublemakers, not so much.

If this is your first Cork O'Connor novel, reach back a few – at least three or four novels – to get your bearings. If you're already a fan, get "Spirit Crossing" and put the phone on silent. You won't answer it anyhow; you'll be occupied.

"The Rainbow Age of Television: An Opinionated History of Queer TV" by Shayna Maci Warner c.2024, Abrams Press \$28.00 304 pages



Wanna hand over the clicker?
You don't want to miss the season
premiere of that show you bingewatched over the summer. You're
invested, a fan who can't wait to see
what happens next. You heard that this
may be the last season and you'll be
sad, if that's so. Is it time to start
looking for another, newer obsession or
will you want to read "The Rainbow
Age of Television" by Shayna Maci
Warner, and find something old?

Like most kids of the '70s, '80s, and '90s, Shayna Maci Warner spent lots of time glued to a television screen, devouring programming before

school, after school, and all summer long. For Warner, that programming eventually led to a revelation. They saw people that looked like them, for which they formed "a personal attachment."

It was "life-changing...'

It didn't happen all at once, and some of TV's "milestones" are forever lost, since broadcasts were live until the 1950s. Shortly after shows were taped and preserved, homosexuality became a "source of worry and blunt fascination" but certain performers carefully presented gently risque characters and dialog that nudged and winked at viewers.

Some queer representation appeared in the 1960s, but it wasn't until the 1970s when dramas began to feature more gay and lesbian characters, however subtly. It took awhile for "the 'rest' of the alphabet" to be represented in a meaningful way and – despite that Star Trek and its many versions included gender-diverse characters – it wasn't until 1996 that an intersex infant was featured on a regular television drama.

Since Ellen DeGeneres came out practically on her namesake TV show and Will & Grace became a wild hit, queer representation on TV has ceased to be an unusual thing. And yet, programmers and writers know that caution is still warranted: sometimes, "there can still be hesitation around pushing the envelope and fear that a queer character who burns too brightly just won't last."

Quick: name three after-school TV shows that aired when you were in Fourth Grade. If you can't do it, one thing's for certain: you need "The Rainbow Age of Television."

But get ready for some argument. Author Shayna Maci Warner offers a rabid fan's look at the best and the worst queer representation had to offer, and you may beg to differ with what they say about various programs. That makes this book a critique, of sorts, but Warner offers plenty of wiggleroom for argument.


Tussling over the finer points of queer programming, though, is only half the fun of reading this book. Microwave a box of pizza snacks or mac-and-cheese, demand "your" sofa seat, and dive into the nostalgia of old TV shows, most of them from the later last century. Yep, your faves are here. It's like having an oldies channel on paper, and in your hand.

This is a must-have for former kids and current TV addicts who are happy to see themselves represented on TV. If that's you, who brought the chips? "The Rainbow Age of Television" will just click.






