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CHICAGO LGBT HALL OF FAME **ANNOUNCES 2024 INDUCTEES**

Former Mayor Lori Lightfoot among 19 Individual Inductees in the "Class of 2024"



The Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame, the only city-sanctioned LGBT Hall of Fame in the world, has announced its slate of 2024 inductees: 19 LGBT-identified individuals, two LGBT-identified organizations, and one "Friend of the Community" (ally). The 2024 inductees, who represent a wide cross-section of the diverse Chicago community, this year include Lori Lightfoot, former Mayor of Chicago; WGN Weekend Morning News co-anchor Sean Lewis; Reverend Charles Straight, senior pastor of the Faith United Methodist Church; John von Rhein, longtime music critic of the Chicago Tribune; and LaTony Alvarado Rivera, executive director of the Chicago Freedom School.

"Mama Gloria" Allen



(posthumous inductee), who pioneered a "Charm School" at the Center on Halsted conducting life lessons on appearance, etiquette, personal interaction, job-interview comportment, hygiene, safe sex, healthy relationships, and self-respect to predominantly young unhoused transgender people.

Dr. Daniel S. Berger



Dr. Daniel S. Berger, founder of Northstar Medical Center (Wellness Home at NorthstarHealthcare), a pioneering researcher in the treatment of HIV through drug therapies, and a nationally noted art collector, for his lifetime of work in health/medicine, civic involvement, and leadership in the arts.

Amailia Black



Advocate for trans rights and visibility and former Special Projects of National Significance researcher, Volunteer and Community Engagement specialist, and executive assistant to the CEO for Howard Brown Health.

Bonsai Bermudez MSW



Co-founder and executive artistic director of the Youth Empowerment Performance Project (YEPP), a program creating a brave environment for LGBTQI+ youth experiencing homelessness to learn new ways to address their struggles and celebrate their strengths through personal leadership and community involvement.

Daniel Dever



Former development director for Howard Brown Memorial Clinic and Children's Place Association and longtime volunteer with Equality Illinois, American Civil Liberties Union of Illinois, Rainbow Railroad, and other organizations. Daniel is currently a board member of the Reader Institute for Community Journalism.

John Foos



Character artist John Foos, aka *Miss Foozie*, noted fundraiser and entertainer since 1997 with a passion for making people feel welcome and have fun at community events including the Northalsted Halloween Parade and the Proud Pet Parade.

Timothy K. Frye



Lead coordinator of PrideChicago and longtime co-coordinator of Chicago's annual LGBT Pride Parade with his husband, Hall of Fame inductee Richard Pfeier, until Pfeier's death in 2019. Following a two-year pandemic- related hiatus, Frye started the Pride Parade tradition again in 2022, continuing to lead the annual event.

Demetrius "Dem" Hopkins



(posthumous inductee), Attorney and music entrepreneur whose influential music nightclub Oz helped establish Chicago's 1980s punk rock scene on a national level. In the 2000's he served on the board of the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless and helped to forge a lasting relationship between CCH and Riot Fest.

Antonio King



The first gay/bi Black man to serve as LGBTQ Health Outreach Liaison at the Chicago Department of Public Health and a founding member of the Chicago Black Gay Men's Caucus, whose dedication to the art of female impersonation and pageantry has been a cornerstone of his advocacy work for more than 25 years.

Sean Lewis



Emmy Award-winning broadcast journalist and Chicago's first out gay news anchor for WGN/Channel 9. Sean has also volunteered hosting events for community organizations including Chicago House, Equality Illinois, The Legacy Project, Test Positive Aware Network, and Brave Space Alliance.

Lori Lightfoot



Former Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot, who served from 2019 through 2023 as the city's first Black female and first out LGBT mayor. She is the first openly lesbian Black woman to serve as mayor of a major American city, making Chicago the first and still only one of the United States' three largest cities to boast an out LGBT chief executive.

Kenneth Martin-Ocasio



Former president of the DuPage Hispanic Task Force, former co-chair of the Latino Consortium, and longstanding board member of the Association of Latinos Motivating Action (ALMA), for his dedication to advancing professional, social, economic, and educational opportunities within the Latinx and LGBTQ+ communities.

Ken Mejia-Beal



Ken Mejia-Beal, advocate and trailblazer in the Black LGBTQ community and leader in numerous political, media, advocacy, and community organizations within and outside the LGBTQ+ community. As the first Black openly gay elected chair of the DuPage County Democratic Party, Ken made history as the first out LGBT political party chair in Illinois.

Channyn Lynne Parker



CEO of Brave Space Alliance, the first Black-led, trans-led LGBTQ + center on Chicago's South Side, recognized for her visionary approach to human rights and social justice. Her advocacy began with achievements at the Cook County Department of Corrections, where she was the first openly transgender woman and advocated vigorously for those in protective custody.

John Peller



President/CEO of AIDS Foundation Chicago (AFC) since 2014. His keen understanding of how health care and policy intersect and his support for innovative practices have established him as a national leader in the HIV field, greatly improving quality of life and health for the LGBTQ+ community in Chicago and beyond.

LaTony Alvarado Rivera




Executive director of the Chicago Freedom School, a 17- year-old nonprofit organization that equips young people and adult allies with the tools to develop strategies for social change. He began his activism at 18 with the Coalition for Sexual Orientation (Illinois Safe Schools Alliance) and served on the education subcommittee for Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson's transition team.

W. Robert Schultz III



Campaign organizer for the Active Transportation Alliance, whose mission is to advocate for walking, bicycling, and public transit to create healthy, sustainable, and equitable communities. He has been a leader in activist eMorts in Illinois ranging from the successful eMort to repeal the death penalty to marriage equality. He also serves on the board of Howard Brown Health and was a founding editor of BLACKlines magazine and a founding member of the Lakeside Pride Music Organization.

Reverend Charles Straight



Senior pastor of the Faith United Methodist Church, president of The People's Lobby Education Institute, and volunteer coordinator for Kupona Network, the first Black HIV service organization in Chicago. He has more than 35 years of committed service in the ministry.

John von Rhein



Classical music critic for the Chicago Tribune for 40 years, whose reviews and features played a significant role in establishing Chicago as a world- class cultural center. His involvement with the Rainbow Railroad, an international organization dedicated to providing life-saving assistance to LGBTQ+ individuals and families fleeing violence and persecution around the world, exemplifies his steadfast commitment to protecting the most vulnerable among us.

The Annual Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony is scheduled to take place on Tuesday, October 1, 2024, at the Chicago History Museum, 1601 N Clark, Chicago. The plaques for the new inductees are traditionally given out by the Mayor of Chicago. Mayor Brandon Johnson has been invited



and we hope he will participate this year.

The Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame, the only city-sanctioned LGBT Hall of Fame in the world, was founded in 1991 to honor Chicago's people and entities, nominated by the community, who have made significant contributions to the quality of life or well-being of the LGBT community and the city of Chicago. The first Chicago Gay & Lesbian Hall of Fame ceremony took place during Pride Week 1991 at Chicago City Hall. Then-mayor Richard M. Daley hosted the ceremony and afterward, photos ofthe inductees were displayed in City Hall. The Hall of Fame maintains a website, which allows anyone to visit the Hall of Fame at any time at https://chicagolgbthalloffame.org. Traditionally, the City of Chicago has displayed the Hall of Fame materials during induction periods, Pride Month, and in October for LGBT History Month.

PrettiBoiRoq Takes Fans on a Wild Spin in New Single, "In My Ride"

After the success of "Bad Bitch Alert", his single with trans rapper Chanel Jole, PrettiBoiRoq is gearing up to show a different side of his music and aesthetic. "I'm out to prove that I have more to say than 'shake your ass and f*ck'." he says.

'shake your ass and f'ck'," he says. His latest track, "In My Ride", is lighthearted, pop-oriented fun. "I don't feel like we have enough representation of love in gay hip hop," he continues. "We have plenty of tracks about sex and casual hook-ups, but not much about real romance, even though most of us live both pretty equally."

"In My Ride" personifies summer love. It was inspired by the artist's own short-lived but high-octane romance. "I had just ended a long-term relationship and was discouraged with the dating scene when I met my 'In My Ride' guy," PrettiBoiRoq recalls. "He showed me I could connect with someone and that I had the ability to love again."

PrettiBoiRoq explains more from his LA home.

Jamie Booth: "In My Ride" is a big change from your previous track with Chanel Jole. Why the 180? PrettiBoiRog: I'm showcasing my diversity as an artist. There will always be a level of Bad Bitch energy to anything I create. It's part of my brand.

JB:Can you take us back and tell us about your journey into hip-hop and what inspired you to start making music?

PBR: I've always been a creative human. I went to school for visual arts and when I moved from North Carolina to Los Angeles, I originally wanted to pursue acting. I quickly realized it wasn't really where my heart was. I would spend a lot of time writing music. I started performing locally and I got a great response. Queer music has always been a thing, but the element that I bring is a main stream appeal. While my lyrics are unapologetically gay, my sound is very top 40.

JB: How has your identity influenced your music and the stories you tell through your lyrics?

PBR: I think gay culture is inherently sexual, especially within the gay male community. I also think a lot of gay males resonate with female artists, especially within hip-hop so I

think a combination of those two aspects shape both my sound and my lyricism.

JB: What are some of the biggest challenges you've faced in the hiphop industry as an out rapper? **PBR:** The biggest challenge any artist faces, regardless of sexuality or orientation, is being taken seriously; proving I'm more than a gimmick. I also struggle because within the community most of the music made is what people would consider drag queen music, which, don't get me wrong, I love. Drag queens have been pillars of our community since the beginning and I love that we celebrate them through music. The music I make, however, doesn't fall under that umbrella.

JB: How do you feel about the current state of LGBTQ+ representation in hip-hop?

PBR: We have way more representation within the queer community now than ever before, but it's still severely lacking. I would love to see more queer artists achieve mainstream success for their talent rather than some novelty. I think we are on the cusp of it.





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JB: Who are your biggest musical influences, both within and outside the hiphop genre?

PBR: Anyone who follows me knows that Nicki Minaj is a huge influence for me. I would also say Iggy Azalea and I love Cazwell. I would watch him on YouTube in my high school days and it was inspiring to see a gay man making music unapologetically. I think you can see little pieces of these artists trickle throughout my work. I certainly don't think I would be where I am today without them.

JB: Can you walk us through your creative process when writing and producing a new track like "In My Ride"?

PBR: When the producer first shared the beat track for "In My Ride", I instantly thought about summer and love and how, as we get older, a lot of the magic of being young and in love dies. It's sad. I think we become more realistic in our expectations. When I started writing this track, I had just started dating someone and it was the first real relationship I had had since I ended an eight-year relationship. I had almost forgotten what it was like to fall in love with someone, and while the relationship didn't last, it gave me hope that I could experience that feeling again.

JB: How have your fans responded to your music and your openness about your sexuality?

PBR: I think the funniest interactions are when I'm recognized outside of performance and people expect this hypersexual over-the-top being and I'm actually very chill and calm. It's an interesting dynamic meeting fans when I'm Cory and not PrettiBoi because we're very different. Even when I'm in the studio with another artist, it's fun to watch them react to me turning on in the booth and then coming out calm, cool and collected.

JB: What advice would you give to other LGBTQ+ artists who are looking to break into the hip-hop



industry?

PBR: Be ready to put your money where your mouth is. You have to be willing to invest in your talent before anybody else will. A lot of people think you make one track, it takes off, you become famous, and the money starts pouring in. That's not how it works. I work two different jobs, six days a week. I manage my own social media and pay for all my studio, recording and mixing out-of-pocket. I work with a team of close friends to help alleviate some of the

creative direction as far as videos and rollouts but again I pay everyone who works for me. I would say stay focused, listen to those close to you, and no matter how hard it gets, never give up on your dreams. The only people who fail are those who stop trying.

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Willi, wontcha?: an interview with queer singer/songwriter Willi Carlisle

For the longest time, queer country and folk music fans didn't have much good music by queer artists from which to choose. Sure, country music provided them with plenty of divas, including Dolly Parton and Reba McEntire, to worship. Willie Nelson was the closest thing to a leftie as could be found in the genre. Whereas folk music was a bit more welcoming to both queer followers and performers.

Much has changed with more country artists coming out, from Lavender Country, Chely Wright, Ty Herndon, and Billy Gilman to Brandy Clark, TJ Osbourne, Brandi Carlile, Jaime Wyatt, Orville Peck, Amethyst Kiah, Jake Blount, Melissa Carper, and Brooke Eden, to name a few. If Arkansas-based Willi Carlisle isn't on your radar yet, he should be. Not only do Carlisle's distinctively poetic lyrics separate him from most of the pack, but as an accomplished multiinstrumentalist, his talent is sure to make a lasting impression. Carlisle, whose remarkable new album "Critterland" (Signature Sounds), was released earlier this year, generously made the time for an interview.

Gregg Shapiro: Willi, I'd like you to say a few words about your musical influences in the folk, country, and LGBTQ+ music worlds.

Willi Carlisle: Welp, I'm an interdisciplinary artist, so my influences are pretty varied! Classic American authors like Walt Whitman and Melville, folksingers Utah Phillips and Ramblin' Jack Elliot, as well as many writers in our contemporary Americana scene. Recently, Anna Tivel, Adeem the Artist, Tyler Childers. I'd also count outliers like the puppeteers Peter Schulman and Micheal Sommers. folk punks like Apes of the State and Defiance! Ohio, plus drag queens and clowns everywhere. A newspaper once called Walt Whitman "a queer occultist or a blethering yokel," and I thought I'd try to be both.

GS: You received an MFA in Poetry from the University of Arkansas. There have been some wonderful queer visiting writers at the school including Robin Becker and Natalie Diaz. With whom did you study while in the MFA program? WC: People make much of my master's degree in poetry [laughs]! I enjoyed some aspects of it, but frankly spent more time with a fiddle


under my chin than with a pen in my hand. I moved to Arkansas to be a folksinger, and the MFA was perhaps a means to an end, even if I didn't see it at the time. I called a square dance or played old-timey music a few nights a week. I studied with Geffrey Davis, Kentuckian Davis McCombs, the neo-formalist Geoffrey Brock, the late Ellen Gilchrist, and, briefly, Henri Cole. I was not a great student, but I adored my colleagues. Closeted and struggling in Arkansas, I was mostly chasing music and love.

GS: Have you published a fulllength poetry collection or chapbook?

WC: Nah. Maybe someday.

GS: Does your background in poetry have anything to do with the inclusion of spoken word tracks such as the title cut from "Peculiar, Missouri" and "The Money Grows On Trees" from "Critterland?"

WC: Sure! But "Peculiar" is my attempt to do a song in the tradition of dozens (if not hundreds) of talking blues story songs, too. "Money Grows on Trees" might be spoken word, but it's a bad-man-ballad like the ones I heard sung about local legends all over Arkansas. Which is



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to say, vernacular poetry and songs have always been in our world, our tradition. The most common question I get is the difference between poetry and music, and there's none. No difference! Lord, let me eschew obfuscation and yank the highfalutin chain of our histories out of every lowly lover.

GS: To my ears, songs such as "I Won't Be Afraid," "Life On the Fence," and "Your Heart's A Big Tent," from "Peculiar, Missouri" and "The Arrangements" and the title tune from "Critterland" wear their queerness on their denim sleeves. Do you have a sense of how these songs been received by folks in the LGBTQ+ community? WC: They seem to like 'em. Because I'm a "daywalker," and spent most of my life passing as straight. I guess I got pretty good at writing gueercoded things. Our audience is diverse and welcoming, and that's my favorite thing about my work. As many bi/pan/yes/and people do, I often don't feel "queer enough." I've never been part of certain queer subcultures or visibility movements. For me, being queer always lived at truck-stops, on Craigslist, while couch-surfing, and frequently involved being afraid, closeted, and tough. It never presented itself in a "respectable" way, so I feel very seen when other LGBTQ+ people like it. At the heart of queerness is a relationship to love, friendship, and sex that goes beyond procreativity, marriage, property, or gender. If I get to sing that into the world, I'm happy.

GS: How do you think these songs have been received by non-LGBTQ+ folks in the folk and country music world?

WC: Honestly? People rarely notice they're queer songs. Or maybe they do but stay hushed about it? In one instance, the brilliant writer Steacy Easton (whose debut memoir "Daddy" I'm stoked to read) said my song "Tulsa's Last Magician" was queer. They're right, but someone took umbrage, said that they thought it was a song about a working-class guy and not a "gay thing," said he was bummed that he'd missed the point. Thing is, the song is both gueer and working class. Sometimes straight folks seem to think if something isn't

straight that they're not allowed to connect to it. Hooey like that keeps our worlds too far apart.

GS: Speaking of which, it was a pleasant surprise to hear musician and ally Darrell Scott playing on most of the songs on "Critterland." How did that collaboration come to be? **WC:** We wanted to work with a dynamic writer and multiinstrumentalist. a DIY-doer, and man of letters. Darrell fit the bill perfectly. We talked about poetry and literature most of the first

night, forgetting to work on songs. [Laughs] Honestly? My management put us in touch. I'm new to this industry and travelled the country playing in honky-tonks without any support or industry bona fides for the better part of a decade before I could've found my way into Darrell's studio.

GS: Many of your songs have a cinematic quality which made me wonder if any of your music has been used in any movies or TV show.

WC: Nah [laughs]! Wouldn't that be cool though?

GS: Is there a style of music that you listen to for your own enjoyment that might surprise your fans?

WC: I'm pretty eclectic! I've enjoyed the rise of Chappell Roan this year, and also like grindcore, extreme metal, doom metal, and polka. I'm not an expert in any of this stuff and



refuse to be too knowledgeable.

GS: Even though she's missing an S, could there be a Willi Carlisle and Brandi Carlile collaboration in your future?

WC: [Laughs] Just sitting here waiting on the call! Let's do this, Brandi.

GS: Finally, you are performing on September 7 as part of the initial Evanston Folk Festival, along with Patty Griffin, Madi Diaz, and Nora O'Connor, among others. What does it mean to you to be part of this festival and line-up?

WC: It means there'll be a big party. As a younger man, I used to go to the Chicago Zen Center in Evanston, and afterwards sit and hit on people in the bookstores, and play banjo insufferably on the streets, hoping Northwestern students would find me handsome. I'm basically doing the same thing, but, getting paid. It's an epic lineup, and I'm gonna give it my all.








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



Buying a Condominium; Avoiding Financial Hell

Q: I just bought my first condominium and one week after I moved in, the association sent me a notice that there would be a special assessment to fix the back porch and stairs and that my share was \$5,000 of the cost. Do I have to pay this? At closing, I also had to pay a large transfer tax to the City of Chicago. What are my options?

A: Before you buy any condominium, you should be prepared to examine a fair amount of paperwork. It is better to work hard before the closing than to wake up to a nightmare of problems afterwards.

When you buy into a condo building, you have to pay the assessments, you are bound to pay the assessments. And if you don't, they will put a lien on your property or evict you. That's why it's important to be diligent before buying a condo unit, looking into the financials of the governing association before closing on a deal.

Before buying, find out if special assessments are anticipated, get a statement of the reserves and find out how they compare to the most recent reserve study.

A reserve study will analyze the financial state of the association's reserves and anticipate expenditures that will be needed down the line. If a study hasn't been done, step back and think about what you're getting into – an Association that may not be adequately prepared for future expenses.

When you buy make sure your sales contract is subject to your review and approval of the following condominium documents:

Declaration, bylaws, rules and regulations. You must be satisfied that you can live within the guidelines that each building imposes. The bylaws can cover pets, leasing your condominium and requirements that the apartment floors must always be carpeted to reduce noise.

Statement of any large

expenditures by the association. This information will let you know if the association is planning a major building repair or improvement that could cause your assessment to increase.

Statement of the amount of the reserve or replacement fund. This information will tell you how well the board of managers is running the building and providing for future unforeseen repairs.

As for transfer taxes, if you will be making an offer to purchase, have your realtor submit your offer with a provision that the city transfer tax and all other transfer taxes, including State of Illinois and Cook



County be split 50/50 by the Seller and Purchaser. This way, some of the pain can be shared with the Seller.

If you are 65 or over, you can obtain a refund if you purchase property valued at \$250,000 or less and live in the premises for at least one year.

Know that if you are purchasing a new condominium, the Illinois Condominium Property Act provides that a "detailed accounting" is to be provided by every developer within 60 days after election of the first unit owner board of managers. The issue that comes up is whether the developer has properly paid assessments. The law requires that the developer pay assessments on unsold units beginning with the first conveyance and to collect assessments from owners of sold units during the period from the first sale until turnover to the unit-owner controlled board.

Also, be aware of the Illinois Home Repair and Remodeling Act, 815 ILCS 513/1. This law requires every contractor who performs home repair, improvement, or remodeling on residential real estate for a sum in excess of \$1,000, to obtain a written contract signed by the home owner, and a give them a copy of the pamphlet "Home Repair: Know Your Consumer Rights," prior to the beginning of the work.

Florida Without the Glitter and Glitz or Gays in the 'Glades

We all know the Florida we've seen on TV and in the movies. From Tampa to Orlando to Fort Lauderdale, Miami to Key West, it's non-stop partying. Everything's fabulous: drag queens rolling around in the streets, glitter falling from the ceiling, disco balls spinning, strobe lights flashing, "Yaaaaasss Queeeeeeen!" It's exhausting. Next time you plan a trip to Florida, add a couple of extra days to your trip and schedule a few days at the Parkway Motel & Marina on Chokoloskee Island to decompress.

Choca-what, you ask? It's in the middle of nowhere, darlings. And that's just the point!

Chokoloskee Island native,
Aaron Tabor, with husband and
business partner David Ardelean (a
partner in Drynk), went back home
to visit Aaron's family and
discovered that the local motel and
marina, dripping in mid-century
charm, was for sale. Being the
entrepreneurial types they are, they
thought why not make this a little
gay getaway? So, they bought it.
While they were at it, they also
bought the HavAnnA Café, the best
restaurant in town. And how are the
locals taking it in this deep red part

of the state? Just fine because they love "the boys" as they refer to David and Aaron. It helps that Aaron's a hometown boy, and the money it brings into town doesn't hurt either. Oh, there are a few locals that make sure you see their Trump signs, but that's about as far as it goes.

Built in 1956 and originally owned by the Smallwood Family, Parkway Village was Chokoloskee's first fishing camp with direct access to gulf channels, and mangrove islands just a few hundred yards away. Surrounded by millions of miles of wilderness with Everglades National Park to the east-southeast, and 10,000 Islands National Wildlife Refuge to the north-northwest. To get there from Fort Lauderdale or Miami, you head west on I-75, aka Alligator Alley, for about an hour and a half. Just before getting to the West Coast of Florida, you hang a left and drive about another half hour until you can't go any farther. It's like a mirror image of Florida on either coast. It's about as rural as you can get, although there have been some recent condominium developments as folks are beginning to discover the easy access to the Gulf of

Mexico's glorious sunsets and reasonable real estate prices.

The Parkway Motel and Marina is located at the end of Highway 29 in southwest Florida's unspoiled coastal estuary on the Ancient Calusa Indian Barrier Island named Chokoloskee. Myriad wildlife brings nature enthusiasts from all over the world to this UNESCO World Heritage Site.

The Parkway Motel offers clean comfortable standard rooms and kitchenette suites. This historic 1950s motel gives you a charming and laid-back Caribbean flair. Standard rooms offer one queen and one full bed, a microwave, minifridge, and can comfortably sleep up to four. The kitchenette rooms offer a bit more space; a small kitchen, along with cooking and eating utensils for meal prep, and can sleep up to four.

A variety of trailers and a cottage are available as accommodation, all air-conditioned. Two of the "modular homes" include a two bed/one bath with a junior kitchen, pull-out sofa sleeper, BBQ grill, and a screened-in patio, a third is a two bed/two bath with central air, pull out sofa, full-sized kitchen, and a washer/dryer.

All three sleep six comfortably. There's also a three bed/two bath double-wide, with a king in the main bedroom, and a futon in the third bedroom. There's a dining area for when you're feeling fancy, covered parking, and a fire pit in the yard. It also sleeps six comfortably.

To get the true backwoods feel rent one of the original homes of the area. Originally owned by the Smallwoods, the historic cottage overlooks the marina. It's a spacious 1,800 square foot, two bedroom/two bath home with a family-sized kitchen and dinette area, a family room with a pull-out sofa sleeper, an en suite main bedroom with a king-sized bed, and twin beds in the second bedroom. It comfortably sleeps six. You can watch the gorgeous sunsets safe from the mosquitos from the screened-in patio which overlooks the marina basin.

If you've got a boat, avoid the traffic, and sail your way to Parkway Marina. It has the closest access to the Gulf and the Everglades National Park in the area. The boat docks are available for rent and can manage most boats. Its full-service marina and tackle shop has everything you'll need for an enjoyable day of fishing, including an incredible historic boat lift.

What is there to do? Not much.
And that's the point. Rent a boat and



tour the mangrove jungles or take an airboat tour of the Everglades. Visit one of the quaint little museums, such as The Smallwood Store, or one of the five Collier County museums. Step back in time and have a cocktail at the historic Rod & Gun Club (skip the food.) Take a side trip to Everglades City. Be sure to rent a boat and head out to the Gulf to watch the sunset. You might even see some dolphins playing in the wake of your boat as I did. Head over to the Fakahatchee Strand

Preserve and walk along the miles of boardwalks through Big Cypress Bend State Park, where you can see nature – at a safe distance. We spotted a couple of alligators. At night, coat yourself with bug spray, put on your long pants and long-sleeved shirts, and sit out and watch the stars.

Dining options in Chokoloskee are limited. There's HavAnnA Café, started in 2003 by Carlos and Dulce Valdez. Carlos worked his kitchen magic while Dulce brought her crowd-pleasing expertise, creating the brand and making it

the go-to spot for the best Cuban cuisine in Collier County. Aaron and David are carrying on traditions in the restaurant while making the cuisine even more delightful. They've added new, mouthwatering "cracker cuisine" to the menu and expanded it with serene outdoor garden seating, Aaron's contemporary sculptures, a few live chickens, and a selection of beers and wines. They've amped up the fun with lively music and weekly activities, making life on Chokoloskee Island even more enjoyable. Occasionally, they'll bring in drag gueens from Fort Lauderdale, Tampa, Orlando, or Miami for weekend shows. We found this place so charming and reasonably priced that we dined there for breakfast and dinner, and were so full after breakfast, that lunch wasn't required. It's a favorite for visitors and locals alike, who seem to have accepted "the boys" as part of the Chokoloskee community. You can also drive to nearby Everglades City to check out a variety of restaurants.

After a few days of rest and relaxation at The Parkway Motel and Marina, you'll be ready to return home, refreshed from your vacation and thinking about when you can return for some of the queer Florida hospitality.

Life "Lessons": An interview with gay writer Jim Provenzano

Young adult (aka Y/A) fiction has come a long way since many of us were, well, young adults. I'm not just talking about maniacal TERF J.K. Rowling's inexplicably popular fantasy novel series either. The presence and representation of queer characters in books, including Alice Oseman's "Heartstopper" series, is central and necessary. This is something of which gay journalist and Lambda Literary Award-winning novelist Jim Provenzano is keenly aware in his debut Y/A novella, "Lessons in Teenage Biology" (Myrmidude Press, 2024). While set in the late 1970s, the story of queer high school student Tom Mollicelli's daily struggles, could just as easily be taking place today. Subjects such as bullying, secret crushes, and family situations, still have the resonance they did almost 50 years ago (or more). Jim was gracious enough to make time for an interview during Pride month 2024.

Gregg Shapiro: If I've done my research thoroughly, "Lessons in Teenage Biology" is your first novella. Do you foresee writing additional novellas about Tom Mollicelli?

Jim Provenzano: I've only written one novel sequel, and that was "Message of Love," the sequel to my fourth novel, "Every Time I Think of You." It wasn't expected, but by the time I finished it, I had already had a bunch of side notes that developed into the sequel. Several advance readers said they wanted more. But I'm not sure about that because I originally wrote this back in 1986. To write more would be kind of impersonating the voice that I had at the time. I've done that before, but I'm not sure I want to do that this time.

GS: I'm guessing that you've been out of high school for a while. However, you've succeeded in giving the setting gravitas and

GS: The 1970s setting of "Lessons in Teenage Biology" made me think about the Y/A books being read during the 1970s, including those by Paul Zindel, Judy Blume, and S.E. Hinton, among others. Do you have a favorite Y/A author from this period?

considered historical fiction [laughs].

JP: I was a voracious reader for as far as I can remember, including getting stickers from the public library for the amount of books I read, or going to the Scholastic Book Fairs as a teen. It's kind of obvious, but JD Salinger's "Catcher in the Rye" just struck a chord for me at the time.

GS: Each of the chapters uses a biological term as its title. Was that something you planned from the start, or did it come later?



JP: As I said, I wrote this in 1986. The first draft was just a flurry of writing on a manual typewriter with paper that I taped together to try to make a scroll like Jack Kerouac did. He was, of course, a big influence for me back in college with my early scribblings. The biological terms came later when I realized I wanted it divided into chapters instead of being a big run-on as the original was written.

I wanted a title that was clearly Young Adult but also clever, like a textbook. The original title was "Little Volcanoes," which is a reference to acne. But in looking up other titles with volcanoes, they were literally about volcanoes, so I didn't want to make that mistake. Of course, Bonnie Garmus' book (and TV series) "Lessons in Chemistry" was a big inspiration for the title. It has a double meaning and I like that.

GS: Bullying, which I think has been around since the beginning of time, appears in the book, prominently represented by the vicious Joe Briggs. Did you experience bullying when you were a teen?

JP: Well, a lot of this is based on actual experiences and yes, I did actually get bullied by a guy in school which led to a fight, and then it was broken up by my late sister.

It's really all an homage to her. The sister character is basically her, too.

GS: I appreciated the way you wrote about religion in the book, particularly at the opening of the "Metaphase" chapter. It serves as a reminder of the way religious fanaticism has been infiltrating

public schools for vears.

JP: Yes. there were a lot of well-intentioned Christian schoolmates who tried to get me to go to church meetings. Mostly I just went because I had a crush on the guy, but it never took. And yes, they would slip those awful Chick Comics in your locker slats, as if a tiny comic book would convert us [laughs]!


GS: In the second and fifth chapters of the book you write about Tom shoplifting a "Playgirl" magazine, which was a kind of rite of passage for a generation of gay men.

JP: I think at that time teenagers didn't have access to gay pornography, and "Playgirl" was so commonly found in mall bookstores. My mom even had a couple copies at one time, and I would sneak into her bedside dresser to get a peek. When I started shoplifting, I would hide them up in the attic. But my

brother found one once and it was very embarrassing.

GS: Writing about sex in a Y/A book seems like a big responsibility. You handle it with ease, including the subjects of masturbation, blow jobs, homoeroticism, when "boners bumped," and, of course, the last page! What are the challenges and rewards of writing about sex?

JP: Writing about sex can either be intentionally erotic or comic. And I tried to do both. The main point of pornography is the plumbing, I guess. The main point of literary descriptions is that you describe everything else that's going on, including the sex.



GS: I don't know if you were thinking about book banning while you were writing "Lessons in Teenage Biology," but if you were, what would it mean to if your novella was banned?

JP: I've joked with other fellow authors that we would love to be banned for publicity purposes, but it's actually a serious issue. Thousands of books have been stolen or taken from schools and public libraries by right wingers, and their efforts often backfire. There are a lot of groups that are fighting to keep books on shelves and to defend librarians and libraries. It's a constant struggle. But being a small mostly self-published author, I'm just happy to get in any public library. My books are in 83 different libraries around the U.S., so it's really great to

> know that they're there.

GS: If there was a movie version of "Lessons in Teenage Biology," who would you like to see as Tom? Who as Chuck?

JP: Actually, I'm not very well informed about young actors today, except the "Heartstopper" guys. As long as the actors were comfortable playing the roles, I'd be happy. Whoever played Chuck would have to be beguiling and charming. Whoever played Tom would have to be a bit naïve; clever, but not completely all there.

A long time ago, I had a literary agent for my first novel, and a bite from a film producer for "Pins." Of course, it never panned out, and I was led by the nose for a long time that it might happen. So, I'm not very enthusiastic about fantasizing about film adaptations.

The best success I had was being asked to write a stage adaptation of "Pins,"


which was done here in San Francisco at New Conservatory Theatre Center in 2002. That was a great experience, because some of the actors were just perfect and it had a successful run. I'm certainly open to film adaptations, and I have a few incomplete screenplays, but I don't get my hopes up. I'd just like people read my books and imagine the characters on their own.

GRAB A BOOK

Sometimes, you just need to step back a minute.

You need time to regroup, to think things through, and a scenery change is the place to do it. Get past your current position, and situations can become clearer somehow. Thoughts can be re-organized. Problems pivot. As in the new novel "Blessings" by Chukwuebuka Ibeh, you'll have a different perspective.

Obiefuna didn't say much on the road to the seminary.

What was there to say? His father had caught him in a too-cozy situation with a young man who'd been taken in as an apprentice and for that, Obiefuna was being sent away. Away from his mother, his younger brother, Ekene, and from the young man that fifteen-year-old Obiefuna was in love with.

Life in seminary was bad – Obiefuna was always on alert for Seniors, who were said to be abusive because abuse was allowed, even encouraged – but things weren't as bad as he thought they might be. He made friends and good grades but he missed his mother. Did she suspect he was gay? Obiefuna wanted to tell her, but he hid who he was.

Mostly, he kept to himself until he caught the eye of Senior Papilo, who was said to be the cruelest of the cruel. Amazingly, though, Senior Papilo became Obiefuna's protector, letting Obiefuna stay in his bed, paying for Obi's first experience with a woman, making sure Obiefuna had better food. Maybe Obiefuna loved Senior Papilo but Senior had other boys, which made Obi work twice as hard to be his favorite. Still, he hid.

And then Senior Papilo passed his final exams and moved on.

So, eventually, did Obiefuna. Sure, there were other boys – one who almost got him expelled, a chaplain who begged forgiveness, and there was even a girl once – but Obi grew up and fully embraced his truth: all he wanted was to be accepted for himself, to be loved.

As Nigeria moved toward making same-sex marriage illegal, though,

neither one looked likely...

So here's the puzzle: the story inside "Blessings" is interesting. Obiefuna is a great character who takes what happens with quiet compliance, as if he long-ago relinquished hope that he could ever control his own life. Instead, he passively lets those who surround him take the reins and though reasons for this are not clearly stated and it's uncomfortable, it's easy to grasp and accept why. This goes, too, for the Seniors whose actions readers will tacitly understand.

What's not easy to accept is that author Chukwuebuka Ibeh's story often slows to a glacial pace, with great chunks of the books' multi-year timeline crunched into basically only highlights. You'll be left loving this story but hating its stride.

The best advice is to embrace this moving novel's message and accept the slowness, love the excellent characters, but don't be surprised if you find yourself checking to see how many pages you have left to crawl through. Yes, you'll enjoy the soultouching cast in "Blessings" but if speed in a plot supersedes good characters, then step back.

Your face is lovely, dewy, and softly unlined.

You paid a lot for that, both monetarily and in pain, in time and in worry. You've tested every product, tried every fad, talked to many dermatologists about staying younger-looking, and you certainly can't stop now. As in the new book, "Pixel Flesh" by Ellen Atlanta, you can't stop aging, either.

Beauty must suffer.

You've heard something like that time and again. Curling your hair tight hurts. It's painful to exercise beyond your limits. Most medical procedures are not without at least a little ouch. But is it worth it?

Many women believe so – in some cases, nearly 1 in 3 of us – but Ellen Atlanta shows that our obsession with

cosmetics and body-altering methods comes with some concerns. These are things that are so-called "empowering," but she sees danger.

It's never-ending, she says: as soon as a woman does one thing to alter her looks, she will be expected to do another because beauty standards escalate and change over time. What was beautiful thirty years ago – both in clothing size, body size, and cosmetically speaking – is no longer acceptable or enough.

"Young girls then look to us, ideal women, to discover that their pursuit of beauty means lifting, shaping, dieting, dyeing, injecting, slicing, scarring, painting, curling, padding, cutting, starving, concealing, and revealing."

It continues, Atlanta says, with high heels (and foot pain), everyday makeup, "or apologising! profusely! as a form of subservience." This, she says, leads to "censorship of women's bodies," especially women of color, overweight women, and "queer women."

To change our attitudes about beauty won't be easy. Google searches for implants and "burn lifts" have risen among 16-to-21-year-olds. Cosmetics counters are full of preteen anti-wrinkle users. A recent survey indicated that one in four seven-year-olds say they've dieted.

In other words, when it comes to negative talk about body image, your children are listening...

A nip here, a tuck there, a whole new look with no harm to it? Or, as author Ellen Atlanta hints, is being "beautiful" toxic from the inside out? The answer – or at least a new way of perceiving the subject – may lie inside "Pixel Flesh."

Just know this: changing the beauty industry is no easier than reading about it. Atlanta throws statistic after survey result at readers, along with outrageous information about patriarchal attitudes toward the female body, sexual harassment, and how porn ties into all this. It's hard to read, both because of the information itself, and because the narrative feels stiff and sometimes a little more complex than it perhaps needs to be. Atlanta seems to focus highly on a certain controversial Hollywood family, rather than general (or other) fashion icons, which also takes some relevance off the table for readers who struggle to totally grasp this issue.

Still, if you've got a young adult in your life, or if you want to step off the treadmill yourself, this book may be the start you need. "Pixel Flesh" may put a new wrinkle in your beauty routine.


