"Modern" family: An interview with "Mid-Century Modern"'s Max Mutchnick

It's been a long time - maybe 25 years when "Will & Grace" debuted since there's been so much excitement about a new, queer sitcom premiering. "Mid-Century Modern," bowing on Hulu on March 28, is the creation of Max Mutchnick and David Kohan, the gay men who were also behind "Will & Grace." Set in Palm Springs, California, following the death of the one of their closest friends, three gay men gather to mourn. Swept up in the emotions of the moment. Bunny (Nathan Lane) suggests that Atlantabased flight attendant Jerry (Matt Bomer) and New York-based fashion editor Arthur (Nathan Lee Graham) move into the mid-century modern home he shares with his mother Sybil (the late Linda Lavin). Over the course of the first season's 10 episodes, hilarity ensues. That is, except for the episode in which they address Sybil's passing. The three male leads are all fabulous, and the ensemble cast, including Pamela Adlon as Bunny's sister Mindy, and the stellar line-up of guest stars, such as Jesse Tyler Ferguson, Vanessa Bayer, Richard Kind, and Cheri Oteri, keep the humor buzzing. Shortly before the premiere of "Mid-Century Modern," Max generously made time for a Zoom interview.

Gregg Shapiro: I'd like to begin by saying it's always a delight to speak to a fellow Emerson College alum. In ways would you say that Emerson impacted your professional and creative life? Max Mutchnick: I think Emerson was the first place that reflected back to me that my voice, my thoughts were good, and they were worth listening to. I developed a confidence at Emerson that did not

exist in my body and soul. It was a collection of a lot of things that took place in Boston, but I mean we can just put it all under the Emerson umbrella.

GS: Before "Will & Grace," you cocreated the NBC sitcom "Boston Common," which starred fellow Emerson alum Anthony Clark. Is it important for you to maintain those kinds of alumni relationships? MM: Because Emersonians are such scrappy little monkeys and they

end up being everywhere in the world, you can't help but work with someone from Emerson at some point in your career. I'm certainly more inclined to engage with someone from Emerson once I learn that they went to my alma mater. For me, it has much more to do with history and loyalty. I don't think of myself as one of those guys that says, "Loyalty means a lot to me. I'm someone that really leans into history." It's just what my life and career turned out to be. The longer I worked with people and the more often I worked with them, the safer that I felt, which means that I was more creative and that's the name of the game. I've got to be as comfortable as possible so I can be as creative as possible. If that means that a person from Emerson is in the room, so be it. (Costume designer)



Lori Eskowitz would be the Emerson version. And then (writer and actor) Dan Bucatinsky would be another version. When I'm around them for a long time, that's when the best stuff comes.

GS: Relationships are important. On that subject, your new Hulu sitcom "Mid-Century Modern" is about the longstanding friendship between three friends, Bunny (Nathan Lane), Jerry (Matt Bomer), and Arthur (Nathan Lee Graham). Do you have a friendship like the one shared by these three men? **MM:** I'm absolutely engaged in a real version of what we're projecting on the show. I have that in my life. I cannot say that I'm Jerry in any way, but the one thing that we do have in common is that in my group, I'm the young one. But I think that that's very common in these families that





we create. There's usually a young one. Our culture is built on learning from our elders. I didn't have a father growing up, so maybe that made me that much more inclined to seek out older, wiser, funnier, meaner friends. I mean the reason why you're looking at a mouthful of straight, white teeth is because one of those old bitches sat across from me about 25 years ago at a diner and said, "Girl, your teeth are a disaster, and you need to get that fixed immediately." What did I know? I was just a kid from Chicago with two nickels in my pocket. But I found three nickels and I went and had new teeth put in my head. But that came from one of my dearest in the group.

GS: Do you think that calling "Mid-Century Modern" a gay "Golden Girls" is a fair description?

MM: No. I think the gay "Golden Girls" was really just used as a tool to pitch the show quickly. We have an expression in town, which is "give me the elevator pitch," because nobody has an attention span. The fastest way you can tell someone what David (Kohan) and I wanted to write, was to say "It's gay Golden

Girls." When you say that to somebody, then they say, "OK, sit down now, tell me more." We did that and then we started to dive into the show and realized pretty quickly that it's not the gay "Golden Girls." No disrespect to the "Golden Girls." It's a masterpiece.

GS: "Mid-Century Modern" is set in Palm Springs. I'm based in Fort Lauderdale, a few blocks south of Wilton Manors, and I was wondering if that gay enclave was ever in consideration for the setting, or was it always going to be in Palm Springs?

MM: You just asked a really incredible question! Because, during COVID, Matt Bomer and I used to walk, because we live close by. We had a little walking group of a few gay gentlemen. On one of those walks, Matt proposed a comedy set in Wilton Manors. He said it would be great to title the show "Wilton Manors." I will tell you that in the building blocks of what got us to "Mid-Century Modern," Wilton Manors, and that suggestion from Matt Bomer on our COVID walks, was part of it.

GS: Is Sybil, played by the late Linda Lavin, modeled after a mother you know?

MM: Rhea Kohan (mother of David and Jenji). When we met with Linda for the first time over Zoom, when she was abroad, David and I explained to her that this was all based on Rhea Kohan. In fact, some of the lines that she (Sybil) speaks in the pilot are the words that Jenji Kohan spoke about her mother in her eulogy at the funeral because it really summed up what the character was all about. Yes, it's very much based on someone.

GS: The Donny Osmond jokes in the second episode of "Mid-Century Modern" reminded me of the Barry Manilow "fanilows" on "Will & Grace." Do you know if Donny is aware that he's featured in the show?

MM: I don't. To tell you the truth, the "fanilow" episode was written when I was not on the show. I was on a forced hiatus, thanks to Jeff Zucker. That was a show that I was not part of. We don't really work that way. The Donny Osmond thing came



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more from Matt's character being a Mormon, and also one of the writers. It's very important to mention that the writing room at "Mid-Century Modern," is (made up of) wonderful and diverse and colorful incredible humans – one of them is an old, white, Irish guy named Don Roos who's brilliant...

GS: ...he's Dan Bucatinsky's husband.
MM: Right! Dan is also part of the writing room. But I believe it was Don who had a thing for Donny, and that's where it comes from. I don't know if Donny has any awareness. The only thing I care about when we turn in an episode like that is I just want to hear from legal that we're approved.

GS: "Mid-Century Modern" also includes opportunities for the singers in the cast. Linda Lavin sang the Jerome Kern/Ira Gershwin tune "Long Ago (And Far Away)" and Nathan Lane and the guys sang "He Had It Coming" from "Chicago." Was it important to give them the chance to exercise those muscles? MM: I don't think it was. I think it really is just the managers' choice. David Kohan and I like that kind of stuff, so we write that kind of stuff. But by no means was there an edict to write that. We know what our cast is capable of, and we will absolutely exploit that if we're lucky enough to have a second season. I have a funky relationship with the song "Long Ago (And Far Away)." It doesn't float my boat, but everybody else loved it. We run a meritocracy, and the best idea will out. That's how that song ended up being in the show. I far prefer the recording of Linda singing "I'll Be Seeing You" over her montage in episode eight, "Here's To You, Mrs. Schneiderman." We were just lucky that Linda had recorded that. That recording was something that she had done and sent to somebody during COVID because she was held up in her apartment. That's what motivated her to make that video and send it. That's how we were able to use that audio.



GS: Being on a streaming service such as Hulu allows for characters to say things they might not get away with on network TV, including a foreskin joke, as well as Sybil's propensity for cursing. MM: And the third line in the show is about him looking like a "reluctant bottom." I don't think that's something you're going to see on ABC anytime soon. David and I liked the opportunity to open up the language of this show because it might possibly open the door to bringing people...I'm going to mix metaphors...into the tent that have never been there before. A generation that writes off a sitcom because that language and that type of comedy isn't the way that they sound. One of the gifts of doing this show on Hulu is that we get to write dialogue that sounds a little bit more like you and I sound. As always, we don't want to do anything just to do

GS: It didn't feel that way.

MM: It's there when it's right.

[Laughs] I want to have a shirt made with Linda's line, as her mother always used to say, "Time is a cunt."


GS: "Mid-Century Modern" also utilizes a lot of Jewish humor. How important is it for you to include that at this time when there is a measurable rise in antisemitism?

MM: I think it's important, but I don't think it's the reason why we did it.

We tried very hard to not write from a place of teaching or preaching. We really are just writing about the stuff that makes us laugh. One of the things that makes something better and something that you can invest in is if it's more specific. We're creating a character whose name is Bunny Schneiderman and his mother's name is Sybil and they made their money in a family-run business, it gets Jewy, and we're not going to shy away from it. But we're definitely not going to address what's going on in the world. That doesn't mean I don't find it very upsetting, but I'm writing always from the point of view of entertaining the largest number of people that I can every week. GS: "Mid-Century Modern" has a

fantastic roster of guest stars including Jesse Tyler Ferguson, Vanessa Bayer, Billie Lourd, Cheri Oteri, Richard Kind, Rhea Perlman, and Judd Hirsch. Are there plans to continue that in future seasons?

MM: Yes. As I keep saying, if we're so lucky that we get to continue, I don't want to do "The Love Boat." Those are fine comic actors, so I don't think it feels like that. But if we get to keep going, what I want to do is broaden the world. Because that gives us more to write about. I want to start to introduce characters that are auxiliary to the individuals. I want to start to meet Arthur's family, so we can return to people. I want to introduce other neighbors, and



different types of gay men because we come in so many different flavors. I think that we should do that only because I'm sure it's what your life is and it's what my life is. I've got a lot of different types. So, yes, we will be doing more.

GS: Finally, Linda Lavin passed away in December

2024, and in a later episode, the subject of her character Sybil's passing is handled sensitively, including the humorous parts. *MM:* We knew we had a tall order. We suffered an incredible loss in the middle of making this comedy. One of the reasons why I think this show works is because we are surrounded by a lot of really talented people. Jim

Burrows and Ryan Murphy, to name two. Ryan played a very big role in telling us that it was important that we address this, that we address it immediately. That we show the world and the show goes on. That wasn't my instinct because I was so inside the grief of losing a friend, because she really was. It wasn't like one of those showbizzy-type relationships.

And this is who she was, by the way, to everybody at the show. It was the way that we decided to go. Let's write this now. Let's not put this at the end of the season. Let's not satellite her in. Let's not "Darren Stevens" the character, which is something we would never do. The other thing that Jim Burrows made very clear to us was the import of

the comedy. You have to write something that starts exactly in the place that these shows start. A set comedy piece that takes place in the kitchen. Because, for David and me, as writers, we said we just want to tell the truth. That's what we want to do with this episode and that's the way that this will probably go best for us. The way that we've dealt with grief in our lives is with humor. That is the way that we framed writing this episode. We wanted it to be a chapter from our lives, and how we experience this loss and how we recover and move on.

The Two-time Grammy Nominee Performs One Night Only at City Winery Chicago

Martha Wash is set to captivate audiences at City Winery Chicago on Friday, May 2, with a one-night-only performance marking the Midwest kickoff of her highly anticipated Martha Wash: The Love and Conflict Tour. Best known for iconic hits like "It's Raining Men" and "Gonna Make You Sweat (Everybody Dance Now)," Wash will usher in the season of love with an unforgettable evening showcasing her signature powerhouse vocals and heartfelt passion. Fans can expect a mesmerizing journey through romantic and deeply moving songs from her acclaimed Love & Conflict album. We spoke with the legendary vocalist from her home in New York.

Robert Hasselow:You started your musical journey singing gospel in church and later studied opera. Do those early influences find their way into your performances today, particularly on this tour? *Martha Wash:* Oh, absolutely. You'll always hear a bit of gospel in my music—it's in my DNA, darlin'. Even though Love & Conflict leans more into soul, rock, blues, and jazz, that gospel foundation is always there. For instance, songs like "Never

Enough Money", "Like Fire", and "Honey My Friend" have that fiery intensity, and that's where the gospel influence shines through. Funny that you mention opera. While Love & Conflict doesn't have any operatic elements, I did bring that approach to my cover of "Dream On" by Aerosmith, which is on my Something Good album. But for Love & Conflict, it's really all about channeling that raw, bluesy, soulful, rock energy that I hope my core fans can get behind.

RH: How does performing songs from Love & Conflict compare to belting out anthems like "It's Raining Men" on stage?

MW: Performing songs from Love & Conflict feels different because they're more personal and emotional. With songs like It's Raining Men, it's all about the energy and celebration. But with Love & Conflict, I'm connecting with the audience in a deeper, more vulnerable way. It's still powerful, just in a different way.

RH: What makes City Winery the perfect venue for this special one-night performance?

MW: This is my first time performing

at any of the City Winery locations, but Chicago's City Winery just felt like a good fit. It has an intimate vibe where you get to connect with the audience, and that's exactly what I want for this show. It's the perfect spot to share the new music from Love & Conflict in a way that feels personal and laid-back.

RH: Let's talk about the album. Love & Conflict represents a bold departure from your dance music roots. What inspired you to explore blues-rock and adult contemporary sounds on this album?

MW: I've always been a fan of so many different genres, and I wanted to create an album that showcased that versatility. With Love & Conflict, I had the freedom to step outside the dance music world and explore a rawer, more organic sound. Gospel, blues, rock, and soul have always been a part of my foundation, and this album gave me the space to lean into those influences.

RH: It delves into themes of love, heartbreak, and resilience. Is there a particular song on Love & Conflict that resonates most deeply with you on a personal

level?

MW: Every song on Love & Conflict is personal, but "Never Enough Money" really stands out. It talks about greed and struggle, and it hits close to home for me, especially in these immediate times we're facing.

RH: Did any of the tracks push you outside of your comfort zone? **MW:** There were definitely moments during the recording of "Like Fire" and "Never Enough Money" where I had to step outside my comfort zone. Both tracks required a raw energy and intensity that I wasn't used to bringing to the table. My producers pushed me to open up emotionally, especially with how I delivered the vocals. It wasn't easy, but once I allowed myself to feel the power behind the songs, everything clicked. It was challenging, but in the end, it was exactly what the songs needed.

RH: Your songs have been featured in countless films and commercials. If you could choose a song from Love & Conflict to be the soundtrack for a movie, which track would it be and why?

MW: That's a good question! I believe all of the songs from Love & Conflict could be licensed in film, as well as theatre. TV, and



commercials. It truly depends on the project, right? But I'm here for the collaborations, darlins'!

RH: Over the years, you've collaborated with some of the biggest names in music. If you could duet with any artist—past or

on a Love & Conflict track. who would it be and why? MW: My favorite artist was Aretha. so l'd have to sav her. She had such a naturally soulful voice, rooted gospel. and she could

present

sing anything. If I had to pick a song, I'd go with "Glamour Flows"— I think we could've really rocked that one together.

RH: What excites you most about the summer ahead?

MW: What excites me most is hitting the road, sharing the music with the fans, meeting new ones, and getting their feedback on the show. It's been a minute since I've toured with my own show.

R H: For fans who have followed you since the early days of Two Tons O' Fun and The Weather Girls, what message do you hope they take away from this tour? MW: For the fans who've been with me since the Two Tons O' Fun and Weather Girls days, I just want to say thank you for sticking with me all these years. I hope that they'll feel the heart and soul in the music on this tour and know that we've all been through some of the same struggles and joys. I want them to know that I'm still here, still doing what I love, and I appreciate their support more than they'll ever know.

"Bad Idea" is a good time: An interview with gay writer Bruce Vilanch

When it comes to writing, prolific and hilarious gay scribe Bruce Vilanch has just about everybody else beat. His distinctive comedic style has earned him two Emmy Awards for the multiple Oscar spectacles he penned. He also has long-standing creative relationships with top- notch artists, including Bette Midler, for whom he has written reams of comedic material. In his second book, "It Seemed Like a Bad Idea at the Time" (Chicago Review Press, 2025), Vilanch shines a klieg light on some of his more infamous efforts including TV fare such as "The Star Wars Holiday Special," "The Paul Lynde Halloween Special," "The Brady Bunch Hour," as well as the movies "Can't Stop The Music" and "The Ice Pirates," demonstrating his ability to have a sense of humor even in the worst situations. Bruce was generous enough to make time for an interview mere days after the book's publication.

Gregg Shapiro: Bruce, there's a 25-year gap between your first book "Bruce!: My Adventures in the Skin Trade and Other Essays" and your new book "It Seemed Like a Bad Idea at the Time." Why was now the time to write a new book?

Bruce Vilanch: During COVID, I found myself on a lot of lockdown podcasts with hosts who were born after I wrote all these shows but encountered them on the Internet. They all wanted to know how these curiosities happened. Who said yes? And did they escape jail on appeal [laughs]? I thought this was a new way to do a sort-of memoir.

GS: "It Seemed Like a Bad Idea at the Time" is full of vivid details. Were you a journal keeper, or was this all written from memory? BV: I do keep a journal, but a lot of the old ones were washed away in a flood. Seriously. So, some of the stuff is just from memory and my haunted dreams.

GS: Would it be fair to say that the book is also a Hollywood/ show business history lesson? After all, there are footnotes. BV: I was afraid a

BV: I was afraid a younger audience wouldn't get many


of the references to things that happened forty years ago, but then I read Mary Rodgers' memoir, which she died before she finished and was completed by Jesse Green, who added footnotes which are as entertaining as the book. So why not give it a twirl? It is a history of a certain kind of show biz, of sorts.

GS: Did you ever think you'd write a book with footnotes?

BV: I never thought I'd write one with explicit sexual positions, but that may be the next one.

GS: Both of your books are nonfiction works. Do you think you might have a novel in you? BV: I would love to give it a go. Novelists tend to go away somewhere to a cabin where they are hobbled by their nurse and I'm not sure I'm that anti-social. I am a good collaborator, but I just have to carve out time to do a novel and

nothing else. For the moment, I'm working on a play.



BV: I would drop in now and again. Kitty's was a dress bar, as in shirt and tie. Clearly, I am not that type. Also, it appealed to the older crowd, and the younger crowd that was hoping to be "sponsored" by the older one, and I fell into neither demo – at the time [laughs].

GS: You were the subject of the 1999 doc "Get Bruce!" and Allan Carr, whom you write about in the "Can't Stop The Music" and "Oscar! Oscar" chapters, was the subject of the 2017 doc "The Fabulous Allan Carr." Is there anyone else that you wrote about in the book that you think would





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make for a good documentary subject?

BV: Everybody is a good documentary subject. I think reality TV has revealed that dirty secret.

GS: Speaking of "Can't Stop The Music," the Village People were featured prominently in the movie. The current POTUS has an affinity for the Village People song "YMCA," and Victor Willis, whom you also write about, claims that the song isn't a gay tune. Do you have any thoughts about that? **BV:** Victor also probably thinks the world is flat and Justin Trudeau is Fidel Castro's son. He's a weird cat who I never really got to know. Now that he controls the Village People brand, he's doing it his way, and it's pretty funny/sad to the original fans who know exactly what the group was about.

GS: In the "Platinum" chapter, you wrote about the tryouts at The Kennedy Center. How do you feel about what's taking place there now?

BV: It's tragic. Hopefully, it will recover in 2028, at which time the title "Country Music Capital of the World" will return to Nashville.

GS: You had the good fortune to work with two of the "Golden Girls" - Bea Arthur and Betty White - on separate occasions. The new Netflix sitcom "Mid-Century Modern" is said to be a gay "Golden Girls." What do you think about that concept?

BV: It's "Golden Girls" meets "Will & Grace," courtesy of Max Mutchnick and David Kohan. creators of the latter. I saw the last episode taped, and it was hilarious. The characters are recognizable types but written with a real humanity that goes beyond stereotypical bitchiness. Also, it was Linda Lavin's last work and she is magnificent.

GS: In the "Oscar! Oscar!" chapter, you write about the



notorious Snow White musical number. With that in mind, would you care to share your thoughts about the forthcoming liveaction Disney "Snow White" movie?

BV: Around town, they are calling it "Snow Woke," and I'm not exactly sure what to make of that. But I will certainly go to see it before rendering a verdict, as unfashionable as that behavior seems to be.

GS: Are there any upcoming

creative projects that you'd like to share with the readers?

BV: If you're in Australia in June, go see "Here You Come Again," a musical using Dolly Parton's music authorized by her. I co-wrote it with Tricia Paoluccio, who plays Dolly, and Gabriel Barre, our director. Funny, sweet, and just off a very successful six-month tour of the UK. You'll have a good time!

Interview with Carnal+ Exclusive Grant Ducati

Tom Olah: In just four years, you've become one of the most recognizable faces in the industry - what do you think it is about you that's captured the attention and hearts of fans worldwide? Grant Ducati: I think it's my authenticity, which comes easily when I enjoy what I do so much. That noticeable enjoyment is what fans have told me they enjoy the most. Being able to share my life on social media, my sexual adventures on OnlyFans, and my studio work with CarnalPlus, BarebackPlus, and FTMPlus has really helped me grow my audience even further.

TO: What's the secret to your onscreen chemistry with your costars?

GD: Something fairly consistent within the industry is how easy most performers are to get along with. We're all there to get the same unique job done, and generally, we understand what each other is going through on camera, so it's always a team effort to make each other's experiences more enjoyable. Something Cade Maddox taught me in my first studio scene was to look for meaningful little intimate moments between cuts if your scene partner is receptive. Being with performers who are only "on" on camera does make it more difficult to enjoy the scene, but I've thankfully only rarely run into that on set, and that was before I joined the Carnal team.

TO: How much of your on-screen persona reflects your real-life desires?



GD: I'd say studio and my own personal content are two different stories. I do enjoy the scenarios and the men I get to film with at Carnal, but over the years, I've been able to create a brand that lets me explore the things I enjoy when I see them in other people's work. So, in short, 100 percent of my online persona reflects my real-life desires.

TO: What's something about you that fans would be surprised to learn?

GD: I never wear underwear in real life. It's great and sexy in bed and on camera, but I'm always freeballing. It gets a little challenging when fans ask to buy my underwear because I never have a surplus! I don't want to

get rid of my good stuff, which I buy for on-camera use, but it's literally all I've got!

TO: When you're not working, how do you like to unwind and recharge?

GD: I'm a homebody for the most part, but I love spending time with my dogs and having chill nights with close friends. My partner and I also do some local gay sports leagues, but on off nights, we love taking the pups to the dog park or Piedmont here in Atlanta. I've always loved playing video games as well, mostly Rockstar and 2K games on Xbox!

TO: What's something you're incredibly passionate about


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outside of your work?

GD: I'm actually a major car nerd, to the point where it's obnoxious at times. Especially outside the US, when I get to see models we don't get back home. I grew up going to car shows with my grandfather, and my godfather being one of the best-known VW tuners and restorers in the USA. Audis have always been my favorite, weirdly being owned by VW, just like my namesake Ducati!

TO: What's a guilty pleasure that always puts a smile on your face? GD: I'm not sure if it's a guilty pleasure, but I love long solo edging sessions. It definitely makes getting solo videos of myself more difficult at times because I don't feel like fans want to watch me stare at my phone and edge for an hour, but it's what I'd rather do sometimes, so I do it anyway, at the cost of making me content. I do at least

occasionally catch the cumshot on camera, so if you've seen a cumshot video of mine with no lead-up, just know that's why!

TO: What's a small, everyday thing that makes you truly happy?

GD: The weather, greenery, and

GD: The weather, greenery, and people of Atlanta and southern hospitality really make my heart full. I tried LA and ended up not being a big fan. I grew up in rural Alabama, deep in the woods off a dirt road, and with Atlanta being known as "the city in the forest," I feel like I belong here much more than LA. The city and my interactions with people left me feeling empty and depressed. Coming home to my roots has completely reversed that and given me back my passion for porn and this industry.

TO: If you could have dinner with any celebrity, living or dead, who

would it be and why?

GD: I feel like the easiest answer would be Lana Del Rey. I grew up and went through high school, college, and my most difficult moments with her music. My stage name "Grant" is derived directly from her legal last name, and even my tattoo on my left hand is styled after her "paradise" tattoo in the same spot. There are some parts about becoming "popular" and life in general that I'd love to ask her advice on as well, but I'd consider any time spent with her a very high point in my life. Like her, I strive to make my work authentic to me, my relationships nourishing for a rich life, and my interactions with the world loving and bright.

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

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

Avoiding Problems When Buying a Home

After looking at what seems like a hundred apartments, you've picked the apartment of your dreams and the time comes to make a purchase offer. Some common problems that I see buyers face when buying either a house or a condominium:

Falling in Love with the Model. In choosing a building it is usually best to buy in the worst building in a good area than buy in the best building in an adequate or marginal area. Ask about the physical condition of the building - recent repairs, structural improvements and planned large special assessments. There have always been three rules in buying real estate: "Location, location and location." Look for access to public transportation, nearness to good shopping areas and restaurants. And, walk the neighborhood, a drive through is never enough.

Overpaying. The seller's asking price for the apartment usually has

been arrived at through negotiation between the seller and the broker. Its is not uncommon for a broker to get a listing to sell an apartment because the broker has suggested a high asking price. Therefore, consider the asking price as the starting point.


When it comes time to make an offer instruct the broker to tell the seller of any offer you wish to make -brokers are obligated under law to convey your offer to the seller regardless of the price.

It will be up to you to do the price negotiation. Brokers aren't any more expert in the negotiating process, all they can do is tell you about the seller's personality. Once you have made your initial offer and the broker comes back with a counter offer you know that the bargaining has begun. If you get a response of "no", look elsewhere. Oftentimes it is best to sit down face to face with the seller. It can be harder for them to reject your offer in person than over the phone.

Hire a Lawyer. When an offer has

been accepted, don't sign the final contract unless you consult with your attorney or there is an attorney approval clause in the contract allowing your attorney five business days to review and cancel the contract. Your lawyer will need the time to review the contract and insist that safeguards and protections be put into the contract for your benefit.

If you as a buyer are feeling pressured to sign the contract with an attorney approval clause, do not deposit the full amount of the earnest money. Only deposit \$500 to \$1,000. The balance can be paid when attorney review and the building inspection contingency is over.



The importance of the sales contract cannot be underestimated. The contract defines the entire relationship between the seller and the buyer, it describes each parties rights and obligations. Merely because the contract is preprinted does not mean that the terms are standard or universally accepted. The law is always changing, costs are always increasing and no purchase of real estate is like any other. The boilerplate terms and fine print have to be reviewed and edited to correspond with your purchase. Most importantly the contract sets forth the seller's obligations to provide good title when it comes time to close.

Pre-Closing Walkthrough. Finally, make sure you have inspected the apartment on the day of closing. Check all the appliances, make sure all promised repairs are done and that the apartment is clean and vacant. This is the time to make sure the seller has done everything they were supposed to do – it will be too late after the closing.

Buying a home is probably the largest financial transaction that most people will ever make. The lawyer makes it easier for the buyer. And a good lawyer will make the purchase of your home a pleasure instead of agony.

Devon Michael Sedrick Confronts Toxicity with Cheeky New Anthem "You Suck"

Devon Michael Sedrick is transforming personal pain into empowerment with his bold new single, "You Suck". Cheeky, playful, and just the right amount of naughty, the track is an anthem for anyone who's ever dealt with someone who made life harder than it needed to be.

"This song sparked from a situation I had at work where my supervisor would tell me that I was the best one minute, and scream at me the next," Devon recalls. "It was a chaotic, toxic environment. It was emotional whiplash nearly every day. It got to the point where even receiving a text from him gave me anxiety. He was sucking the life out of me."

At its core, "You Suck" is about reclaiming power, processing pain, and releasing the emotional baggage that others try to hand us.

"It's about acknowledging the suck and then letting it go," Devon says. "People can suck sometimes, but it's never about you. So why hold on to it?"

Raised in Nampa, Idaho as the eldest of six in a loud, mixed-race Mormon household-Filipino mom, European dad - Devon developed a love for connection and selfexpression. "We were wild, loud, full of chaos and music," he says. "Being raised in such a unique family, then coming out as gay and leaving the church, it all shaped how I view the importance of vulnerability and what it means to express yourself authentically." His sound reflects that eclectic background, drawing influence from artists like Matt Corby, Tash Sultana, H.E.R., Rainbow Kitten Surprise, and Doechii.

Written and produced entirely by Devon, "You Suck" also spotlights his one-man-band looping style—a craft he began developing after moving to Los Angeles. "I came here thinking I'd collaborate with other artists but then came covid. So, I picked up a looper pedal and started building songs layer by layer, on my own."



While "You Suck" delivers sass and humor, Devon's broader body of work dives fearlessly into more tender and taboo emotional spaces. From rage and shame to suicidal ideation and the journey toward self-acceptance, his music gives voice to the feelings many are afraid to express. "I've been unpacking my anger, and the parts of myself I've been ashamed of or felt the need to hide," he shares. "I want people to be able to explore and understand all parts of themselves, especially the hard parts."


Music, for Devon, is more than performance; it's personal liberation. "My goal is to write from an honest place and inspire others to express


themselves more fully," he says. "'You Suck' is me putting my foot down and saying what I really feel—something I wasn't able to do with my earlier single 'IDK,' which came from a much more unsure place."

He hopes the song serves as a liberating reminder for anyone stuck in a joyless, draining relationship that it's okay to draw boundaries, reclaim your power, and even laugh about it. "I have a tendency to stay in bad relationships too long," he admits. "I always want to believe the best in people, but this song is a reminder to myself—and anyone else—that sometimes enough is enough."



GRAB A BOOK

"The Cost of Fear: Why Most Safety Advice is Sexist and How We Can Stop Gender-Based Violence" by Meg Stone c.2025, Beacon Press\$26.95 232 pages



The footsteps fell behind you, keeping pace.

They were loud as an airplane, a few decibels below the beat of your heart. Yes, someone was following you, and you shouldn't have let it happen. You're no dummy. You're no wimp. Read the new book, "The Cost of Fear" by Meg Stone, and you're no statistic.

Ask around.

Query young women, older women, grandmothers and teenagers. Ask gay men, lesbians, and trans individuals, and chances are that every one of them has a story of being scared of another person in a public place. Scared – or worse.

Says Meg Stone, nearly half of the women in a recent survey reported having "experienced... unwanted sexual contact" of some sort. Almost a quarter of the men surveyed said the same. Nearly thirty percent of men in another survey admitted to having "perpetrated some form of sexual assault."

We focus on these statistics, says Stone, but we advise ineffectual safety measures.

"Victim blame is rampant," she says, and women and LGBTQ individuals are taught avoidance methods that may not work. If someone's in the "early stages of their careers," perpetrators may still hold all the cards through threats and career blackmail. Stone cites cases in which someone who was assaulted reported the crime, but police dropped the ball. Old tropes still exist and repeating or relying on them may be downright dangerous.

As a result of such ineffectiveness, fear keeps frightened individuals from normal activities, leaving the house, shopping, going out with friends for an evening.

So how can you stay safe? Says Stone, learn how to fight back by using your whole body, not just your hands. Be willing to record what's happening. Don't abandon your activism, she says; in fact, join a group that helps give people tools to protect themselves. Learn the right way to stand up for someone who's uncomfortable or endangered. Remember that you can't be blamed for another person's bad behavior, and it shouldn't mean you can't react.

If you pick up "The Cost of Fear," hoping to learn ways to protect yourself, there are two things to keep in mind.

First, though most of this book is written for women, it doesn't take much of a leap to see how its advice could translate to any other world. Author Meg Stone, in fact, includes people of all ages, genders, and all races in her case studies and lessons, and she clearly explains a bit of what she teaches in her classes. That width is helpful, and welcome.

Secondly, she asks readers to do something potentially controversial: she requests changes in sentencing laws for certain former and rehabilitated abusers, particularly for offenders who were teens when sentenced. Stone lays out her reasoning and begs for understanding; still, some readers may be resistant and some may be triggered.

Keep that in mind, and "The Cost of Fear" is a great book for a young adult or anyone who needs to increase alertness, adopt careful practices, and stay safe. Take steps to have it soon

A, B, B, A.

That's not only how you spell the name of a popular music group. That's also how a poem might be structured, if it rhymes, or it might be created in other ways. That's the thing about poetry: it's all how you perceive it when creating it and reading it. So why not think about putting these great poetry books on your shelf this month...?

When you spend time with poetry, you expect a certain kind of relationship between author and reader. That's only part of what you get in "The Space

Between Men" by Mia S. Willis (Penguin Poets, \$20). It might also change the way you feel. Here, Willis – a poet, historian, and educator – explores culture, Black history, and what it's like to be Black, Southern, and queer. When those various experiences come together in poetry here, it invites readers to consider the width and depth of the spaces, and their mere existence. If short but image-fueled poetry appeals to you, this book is worth a good look.

Poetry can take your thoughts in many directions, including thoughts about yourself. If you're hungry for soulsearching, then try "Is This My Final Form?" by Amy Gerstler (Penguin Poets, \$20).

Life doesn't follow a straight line. Some things are two things at once and situations can change, which are two points that seem to be everywhere inside this book. Is this a series of biographical poems with a twist of imagination, or are the poems in here a collection of new perceptions and ways to embrace what could be? Read, and think about it because it's up for a reader's interpretation. However you perceive these poems, you may chuckle sometimes. For sure, you'll want to read them again and think anew.

And finally, if your child loves the beauty of poetry and wonders how to create poems, then "The One and Only Rumi" by Rabiah York, illustrated by Maneli Manouchehri (Penguin, \$18.99) is a book to bring to the table.

Here, children will learn the story of Muhammad, a wise young boy whose life changed when Genghis Khan came to his village. Muhammad was only allowed to fill a bag with possessions and he knew he'd miss the birds and the friends he'd made at home. His father said it was unlikely that they'd ever return.

Yes, there were other birds and other friends in his lifetime, but Muhammad never forgot the first ones and "he never stopped listening" to the wind or the sound of the leaves or the laughter of others. He grew to become a man, a teacher, and a poet, as your 8-to-12year-old will see in this beautifully illustrated, beautifully told book. If these collections about poetry and life don't quite fit what you need, be sure to ask your favorite bookseller or librarian for more. They can help you find poetry, silly rhymes, great biographies, and collections of verse that are perfect volumes with which to spend hours. In the meantime, give these poetry books an "A."
