"Fun" farewell: An interview with Cyndi Lauper

When I did the tally, I realized that, including this one, I've had the pleasure of interviewing Cyndi Lauper nine times since 1997. Of course, that doesn't match the number of times I've been fortunate to see her perform live - that would be 12, beginning in 1984. And now, as I prepare to see her for a 13th time, it's with a touch of sadness as Lauper is embarking on her farewell tour. One of the best friends the LGBTQ+ community has ever had. Lauper's multi-artist True Colors Tours, which ran from 2007-2010 and raised funds for the Matthew Shepard Foundation, PFLAG, and HRC, and the subsequent founding of True Colors United in 2008, which continues to help homeless LGBTQ+ youth, are just a couple of examples her activism. Additionally, Lauper is a lifetime musical trendsetter. For instance, she recorded a duet with the late Tony Benett, more than 10 years before Lady Gaga did, as well as releasing dance-oriented and country music albums, 14 and 8 years, respectively, before Beyoncé. When it comes to her legendary personal style, social media fashion critic Nicky Campbell recently

declared Lauper an icon in his review of the 2024 VMA fashions. Now, as we prepare to say farewell to Lauper on the concert tour circuit, she was generous enough to make time for an interview before hitting the road.

Gregg Shapiro: In preparing for this interview, in which we're talking about your farewell tour, I pulled out my 12 ticket stubs from your concerts I've attended since 1984, beginning with two that year in Boston. Do you remember what that first, headlining tour as a solo artist felt like for you?

Cyndi Lauper: I just wanted to make sure I had places to go. I wanted the sound to be really great. I don't know if I accomplished that, but I did have those big speakers that I used to run up on. That's me! I loved that. Because I saw all those wonderful English groups, the ska bands... GS:... you mean Madness and The English Beat and The Specials? CL: The Specials! I thought they were extraordinary. The singer (Neville Staple), I don't know where his family was from, I guess he could have been Jamaican English. He was so fierce, singing so great, and he climbed up on top of the speaker and put up his fist and he's singing

his guts out. I'm thinking, "It's Mighty Mouse!" When I was a kid that was kind of my favorite show, I don't know why [laughs]. But it always influenced me, and I remember in '84, '85 I was still free. When '86 came then I became a prisoner of the system.

GS: Being on a major record label, and all that.

CL: I wasn't allowed to touch anybody. I wasn't allowed to go out to them (in the audience) or have them come to me. It was totally different, and I totally hated it.

GS: Did you ever imagine that 40 years later you would be embarking on a farewell tour?

CL: Well, at some point, sure. I think that for me this is the perfect time. Because it's a kind of bucket list of what I always wanted to do. In the beginning, it was roughneck style. Whatever I could jimmy-rig, I did. When I got to a certain point. like we were doing the (live) "Money Changes Everything" video. I had fantasies of a cherry-picker. Because of our budget, everyone said "Well, you can't get a cherry-picker but we'll give you a garbage pail and a pulley system. I thought to myself, "Oh no, like Oscar the Grouch?" I

had a friend who was a great interviewer, and she used to interview everybody from a garbage pail. So, of course, that's what my people gave me to go up in the crowd. I thought it was a pulley system. The pulley system was actually 10 men with rope holding it. When I started to shake (while singing), I started to slip out of their hands. They brought me right in. That could have been the reason that the lawyer made me sign my will before I left.

GS: Are you planning to sing songs from each of your albums? CL: I'm really trying. I didn't get anything from the blues album (2010's "Memphis Blues") in there because there's too many songs. I usually get to the point where (I say), "Hey, guys, if the visuals look good for this, can we switch the songs?" What I did was I wanted to do visuals (on the tour). I wanted to do performance art. That means you have to be on a click. Like when I went out on the (Rod) Stewart tour and we used the lyric video of "Sally's Pigeons." You can't do that and not be on a click, because the guy running visual has to be on the click. If nobody's together, it's like, "Hey, what the hell now the words are there... no they're not."

GS: It's like a badly dubbed movie. CL: Yeah. But this time I got this wonderful visual director, Brian Burke, who worked for years with the creative director of Cirque Du Soleil, and not having people flying through the air. In the beginning of all that, that was my fantasy! I wanted to fly through the air, and all I got was a cherry-picker - not a cherrypicker, but a garbage pail. It wasn't going to happen for me. Now, I'm 71! I'm not gonna go flying through the air. It's a mixture of collabs with artists and art. Art and music. The whole thing is an artist collective, any time you go out on tour. It's not just you. You're with other dance artists if you're a dancer, or you're with musicians. Or you're with lighting designers, that's art, too. We did these collabs and I'm excited to present a show like this because it's something I always wanted to do. Fingers crossed that it all works out. I'm even going to do costume changes this time, which you know I never do because it's so

bothersome. But I can do it in a way now that I'm comfortable with. I just want to be able to do this as a gift to all the people that followed me through all my crazy twists and turns. I did all those twists and turns because I kept hitting brick walls. You keep hitting the gatekeeper, you gotta find your way around that gatekeeper.

GS: Earlier this year, "Let The Canary Sing," Alison Ellwood's documentary about you received a theatrical

release. After having your memoir published in 2012, did it feel to you like the documentary was the next logical step, a continuation of sorts?

CL: Well, not for me. I didn't want to have a documentary. It was the pandemic, and everyone was saying, "Everybody's doing documentaries now, Cyn! Come on, what are you doing?" I was like, "I'm not dead!" Then I started watching documentaries on the streaming services and I saw "Laurel Canyon." I felt it was an extraordinarily captivating documentary for me because it was the history of music. All of the people and players in that story were very much influential for me as a growing artist, especially in the '70s. I looked and saw who directed it...

GS: Alison Ellwood!

CL: When they came at me again, I said, "I want a film, not a TV special. So, how about Alison Ellwood? She makes films." She wanted to do it! I think she did a good job. It's not your typical story. I don't think anybody's story is typical. Right? We

think we know people but I guess we don't. You think, "It's typical! You start a band." Which is always my theory! If something's wrong, start a band, start playing out, you'll feel a lot better!" [Laughs] It doesn't always go that way.

GS: With the end of touring in sight, is there a possibility that you might do more film work for a potential Oscar to complete your EGOT status?

CL: Listen, I happen to love independent films. For that I would write. I wrote "Unhook The Stars" for...

GS: ...the Gena Rowlands movie.

CL: Right! Usually, I like an independent movie because then you get to talk to the director and then you have to understand what their vision is. That's interesting, becaus each director is a different personality and a different kind of artist. You have to listen and see what story they're trying to tell and then have a couple of different suggestions. When we first wrote "Who Let In the Rain," I wrote it with

GS: Oh, the late Allee Willis. CL: Allee Willis was a great songwriter.

GS: Did you see that documentary?

CL: No, I wish I did because I miss her so much. I guess I was talking to the director, and we didn't have a band, so I just sang (sings) "They fall like rain," and, in between, her dog, Orbit would bark. I was like, "OK, the dog is musical," and everyone laughed. Then, I described it to the director as "Chinese Motown." That would scare most people. To me, I hear influences of every culture in American music. That's how I make my music: with different influences. Like cooking, like spices. I feel grateful that I was brought up in New York City because I was exposed to so many different cultures.

GS: On a final serious note, when I saw you perform in Boca Raton in 2016 in support of your "Detour" album, you asked for a moment of silence to honor Christina Grimmie who had been shot and killed in Orlando the night before. The next morning, after your concert, many of us woke up to the news of the shooting at the Pulse nightclub in

Orlando. With those tragedies in mind, and this upcoming election, which is so terribly important, especially for women and LGBTQ+ folks, is there anything you'd like to say to your fans?

CL: Absolutely! There is an organization called Vote411.org. Taylor Swift recently, finally put that up. You go online and you find out all the questions and all the people that are running and what they voted for so that you can make an intelligent decision on who is going to represent you, not them. This war against women has been going on since the '60s, it's just been going and going, and we need to stop it because we are half the population. As far as the LGBTQ people, you have to vote. You have to be informed. Every time you have to vote, you vote! Don't say, "Oh, it doesn't matter for this one." It matters! Because they put laws in there. There are community people that represent you and you need to start on a community level, a grassroots level to ensure that there are people that are going to speak for you as a human being. We are all human beings here. As I said, women are half the population and LGBTQ, I venture to bet are pretty large part, too. This country was founded on the separation of church and state. Separation! I

ownership over my body. They say they want local communities in charge but yet they have SCOTUS making federal laws about what you do in your bedroom and what you do with your body and who you are and nullifying families. Oh, I have a lot to say about that. You need to vote! You vote on every voting occasion. You can't just lie down and get rolled over. This is our country, too. And always share your stories. Because people who work with you, that you're friends with, sometimes they don't understand. They don't know. What's really interesting now, from when we started with True Colors United, I think that people do not understand gender identity, which is a whole different thing. If you want people to listen to you, vou've got to listen to them. Just because they're different from you, doesn't mean that you have to be like them. You have to learn on both sides of the fence. Knock the fence down, because we're all human beings; just everybody's different, that's all.

Q-Music: Listening to lesbians

It must be a testament to the commitment of the members of the B-52s that each of its remaining long-term members, Kate Pierson, Fred Schneider, and Cindy Wilson, have only released two albums apiece under their own names over the course of the band's 45-year recording career. Pierson's latest album, "Radio & Rainbows" (Long Meadow Music/ Crush Music/SongVest Records), arrives 91/2 years after 2015's "Guitars and Microphones" (anyone else see a pattern here?). Dedicated to Pierson's wife. Monica Nation, the album takes Pierson in a variety of musical directions, including dance ("Take Me Back to the Party," cowritten with Jimmy Harry, who has worked with RuPaul, Pink, Kelly Clarkson, and others, and the soaring "Wings"), the suitably spooky "Every Day Is Halloween" (co-written with and



featuring Sia), the island breeze of "Pillow Queen", the funky "Dream On" and "Living In a Monet" (featuring queer musician Gail Ann Dorsey), and the colorful title cut.

After 25 years of releasing albums (nearly a dozen!) on the indie Blue Corn Music record label, the amazing queer singer/ songwriter **Ruthie Foster** is now on the legendary Sun Records label with her newest release "Mileage" (Sun). Pressed on vivid baby blue vinyl, the 10-song album, consisting of nine Foster originals

(co-written with the record's producer Tyler Bryant and Rebecca Lovell) contains Foster's blend of influences. such as gospel ("Good For My Soul" and "Six Mile Water"), searing blues-pop ("Done," featuring sister duo Larkin Poe. "Heartshine," and title cut), a radiant love song ("Rainbow"), and soulful stomp ("Slow Down"), all delivered in her powerful vocal style.

Led by queer frontwoman Jen Dot and featuring trans musician Jesse Fevvers, Chicago quintet **Beastii** makes rip-roaring dance punk on its new album "Follower"

(beastie.bandcamp.com). At just over two minutes in length, the second track "The Limit" exemplifies the spirit (and blistering brevity) of early classic punk. "Spilt Milk" and "Butch Beach" conjure images of surfers riding the waves of Lake Michigan, while "Evil Eye" and "Trusted Mystik" represent darkwave at its eeriest.

Ever since "The Omnichord Real Book," Meshell Ndegeocello's Grammy-winning 2023 career comeback, the queer singer/ songwriter and bassist extraordinaire has been on a thrilling trajectory. Her new album, "No More Water: The Gospel of James Baldwin" (Blue Note), continues that stellar course. A tribute to Baldwin for his centennial, as well as fellow lesbian literary legend Audre Lorde, and other queer thinkers, including biracial poet Staceyann Chin who can be heard reciting Baldwin's words ("Baldwin Manifesto I," "Baldwin Manifesto II") as well as her own poetry ("Thus Sayeth The Lorde," "Tsunami Rising," and "Raise The Roof"), the album is an incredible combination of music, song, and spoken word that once again proves Ndegeocello's genius as a collaborative artist.

Melissa Carper has her queer country bona fides in her blood, as



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she sings in the title track to her magnificent new album "Borned In Ya" (Mae Music/Thirty Tigers). If'n you didn't know any better, you might think you were listening to a vintage 78 RPM on the old Victrola. The arrangements are pure country swing and Carper's vocals are somewhere between Billie Holiday and Patsy Cline. The 10 Carper originals (some of which are co-written), including the flawless title cut, "Your Furniture's Too Nice," "Somewhere Between Texas and Tennessee," "Let's Get Outta Here," "Lucky Five," and "Let's Stay Single Together," effortlessly conjure a sensation of nostalgia crossed with déjà vu. Carper's reading of Cole Porter's "Every Time We Say Goodbye," breathes new life into the


After releasing albums on the Arista and Velvel labels, as well as Indigo Girl Amy Ray's Daemon Records, lesbian singer/ songwriter Michelle Malone found a home on her own indie SBS Records. Her aptly titled new album, "Southern Comfort" (SBS) is where Southern rock and country music intersect, with the title track about homesickness being a perfect example. "I Choke On My Words" is a stunner and deserves to be a hit for Malone (or anyone wise enough to cover it). Also noteworthy are "I Want To Be In That Picture," "Like Mother Like Daughter," "One Track Mind," and "Wine and Regret."

If you've been following fruitful queer singer/songwriter **Rachael**





Sage throughout her nearly 30-year career, you may remember that, backed by a band, she mainly accompanied herself on piano and or organ. On later albums, such as 2014's "Blue Roses," Sage began to show off her guitar skills, then took it a step further by releasing acoustic rerecordings, including 2019's "Pseudomyopia" (another take on 2018's "Myopia"). All of this is to say that it's not all that surprising that Sage's new album, the marvelous "Another Side" (MPress), consisting of "acoustic reimaginings" of her 2023 record "The Other Side," is a pleasure. The addition of harmony vocals by queer singer/songwriter Crys Matthews on "Albatross" is truly a bonus.

Smashby Hearts Himself

Born in the industrial UK city of Bradford, West Yorkshire, Smashby's journey as a music artist has been shaped by the challenges he faced growing up queer in a conservative environment. While bullying was tough in Bradford, things didn't improve much when his family moved to the Yorkshire Dales countryside. Despite the struggles, Smashby found solace in the support of his mother, who he describes as more like a big sister, and his grandparents, who have become his biggest cheerleaders, attending every show he performs.

Smashby came out at 15, embracing his identity despite the tough reactions of those around him. Today, he doesn't concern himself with labels or gender stereotypes, focusing instead on living authentically and bringing light into people's lives through his music.

His latest track is "Love Myself (How I Used to Love You)". We caught up with Smashby from his recording studio.

Tim Blankenship: What inspired your new song?

Smashby: "Love Myself (How I Used to Love You)" was inspired by my first heartbreak. He just got engaged and it made me reflect on that time in my life. How in love with him I was and how much of my energy was wasted on him! That energy would have been better spent on learning to love myself.

T.B: Is that the main message of the song?

Smashby: The song's message is to understand your worth as a person. It's important to accept your flaws and imperfections the way you would with somebody you wanna be with. People come and go in our lives all the time; we have ourselves for as long as we live, so put more love into



yourself rather than someone who might break your heart.

T.B: How would you describe its sound?

Smashby: It is an uplifting country pop banger! Every time I listen to it, I feel like I'm driving on an open road with the rooftop down.

T.B: How would you describe yourself as an artist?

Smashby: I'd describe myself as honest and adventurous.

T.B: Smashby is an adventurous name!

Smashby: Smashby was a nickname given to me by a P.E teacher I had in school. I hated P.E but my teacher was hot so I liked the nickname.

T.B: What are the main themes that you explore in your music?
Smashby: I write songs about people I've been in love with who have no idea, fights and friendship break ups, strains on some of my relationships with my family and my

own personal insecurities.

T.B: Was there a time that you struggled with loving yourself? Smashby: My whole adolescence! Once I came out, a lot of my insecurities started to disappear. I finally began to live within my own boundaries.

T.B: Do you tend to put the needs of others before your own? Smashby: Yes, I'm a bit of a people pleaser.

T.B: What made you realize it was time to love yourself for who you are?

Smashby: The last time I realized I needed to work on loving myself was when I totaled up how much I was spending on cosmetic enhancements. I'm all for a little antiaging tweak but I became so addicted to filler and changing my appearance! Getting the treatments made me feel special and important, but I've managed to finally get over that and calm it down.

T.B: What do you hope fans

ultimately take away from song?

Smashby: I hope they feel a sense of empowerment when listening to this song; a feeling of not needing someone else to feel complete.

T.B: Are you currently working on additional songs?

Smashby: I'm working on a bunch of songs right now with my team, (writer) Emmie Jay and (producer) Velvet Code and it's my best work yet! I scrapped a whole album that I was working on with


some other producers over the past three years. It wasn't me anymore and I had to break away to work with my new team. It was the best thing I could have done for my artistry.

Motor City Rebound: New Mid Town Food Hall, New Cork Town Hotel, New Bridge to Canada and More

The rebound of the Motor City continues unabated. The once downtrodden area has transformed itself. A vibrant downtown, a stunning new bridge to Canada, a new food hall in Midtown Detroit, a new hotel in Cork Town, and fun suburbs like Ferndale, Clawson, and Royal Oak are full of things to do.

WHAT TO DO

Run or walk with Frontrunners on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. They meet in front of Prontos in Royal Oak. Explore the gayish village, Ferndale. You will find the Affirmation's Community Center at 205 W. Nine Mile. Enjoy the refurbished Michigan Central train station in Corktown and explore the historic Detroit neighborhood. Walk along the Detroit River and take in the Campus Martius campus. Ride the new Q Line Street car and enjoy the museums in midtown including the iconic Detroit Institute of Arts. Explore Clawson and its new hipster downtown. We liked the Whiskey Taco Foxtrot (28 Main Street in Clawson). Try the Mini Beef Nachos. Strohs (a local beer) is just \$2. The Royal Oak Farmers

Market on Saturdays is a must.

GETTIING THERE

Amtrak has great service including to Detroit, Royal Oak, and Birmingham from Chicago. Trains run three times a day and go 100 mph.Detroit Metro Airport in Romulus features a new express bus to downtown.

The new SMART Fast Bus moves you around town.

Otherwise, you will need a car. You are in the Motor City.

WHERE TO STAY

I stayed at the Hampton Inn Madison Heights and then the Baymont Madison Heights. Walk to nearby restaurants and the Powerhouse Gym plus the Value Center Marketplace grocery store. Right off I-75 at 14 Mile Road. The Hyatt Place in downtown Royal Oak is another favorite.

The new Godfrey Hotel in Corktown in Detroit has a great rooftop bar (The I/O Rooftop Lounge) on the seventh floor. Nice and extremely high end. Stunning views of downtown and the Ambassador Bridge. You will find them at 1401 Michigan Avenue complete with brick streets. This is Detroit's oldest neighborhood.

WHERE TO EAT

The new food hall in Midtown, Detroit Shipping Company (474 Peterboro,

DetroitShippingCompany.com) features two bars and around 10 carry outs set in containers with seating in the middle and upstairs, the fun scene features Thai Food (Bangkok 96 Street Food), Mediterranean (Halal Street) and more. Try the crispy fried chicken bowl at Bangkok 96. The spring rolls were excellent.

Enjoy the Lebanese (Middle Eastern cuisine) which features great fresh juices like raw carrot juice. There are over 400 restaurants in the metro area. 400! I liked the Royal Grill in Madison Heights (1467 W. 14 Mile in Madison Heights). Try the Gallayah Sandwich which features vegetables and meat). Even the gas stations have Lebanese food to go!

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NIGHTLIFE

Pronto is a fun bar and restaurant in Royal Oak with a drag bingo bar next door (the Five 15) which is quite popular. Prontos has a great dance floor and outdoor patio too.

SOHO is the Ferndale staple on 9th Mile and the best bar in Detroit. Surrounded by shops and restaurants, explore Ferndale while you are

there. Next door in the 215 West which features special events and is owned by SOHO. Nearby is the Ferndale Elks Lodge which my friends like. Live bands, music bingo, trivia nights, and karaoke happen at this welcoming venue. Also in Ferndale is Affirmations LGBTQ+Community Center.







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TENANTS BY THE ENTIRETY VS. JOINT TENANCY

Q: My lover and I bought our house together and hold title in joint tenancy. After many years together, we got married two years ago. Our lawyer said that in case one of us should die the house would go to the survivor with or without a will. I put up all the money for the down payment for the house and am concerned that I will be protected. My partner is in business for himself and is struggling financially. I am worried he will have creditors that may try to take away the house. Does owning the house in joint tenancy give me the protection I need? A: Many couples own title to their homes as "joint tenants with right of survivorship" to ensure that title to the house will pass to the surviving partner if one should die. When one joint tenant dies, the remaining joint tenant automatically owns the entire property, without the necessity of probate court proceedings. Even if


the deceased partner had a will, title to the property transfers to the survivor, regardless of the terms of the will.

When a joint tenant dies, all that is usually required to clear the title of the deceased joint tenant's interest is to submit to the title insurance company, which examines the status of title, an affidavit of survivorship and a certified copy of the deceased joint tenant's death certificate.

Ownership as tenants in common for two people, means that upon the death of either owner, their 50 percent interest in the real estate transfers to their heirs (or if they have a will to the person named in the will) and the survivor will only own the other 50 percent of the real estate along with the heirs of the deceased partner.

With the passage of Illinois Marriage and Illinois Civil Unions, there is now a third way LGBT couples can own real estate together. Since 1990, married couples in Illinois have

enjoyed the option of owning their Illinois marital home as tenants by the entirety. Tenancy by the entirety combines the survivorship attributes of joint tenancy with the bonus of limited protection against creditors. That is, a judgment creditor of just one of the married homeowners cannot enforce its lien against the residence of the homeowners owned as tenants by the entirety. Tenancy by the entirety has often been touted as ideal for people who are married, in business for themselves, or whose work leaves them vulnerable to the lawsuits of disgruntled clients,



patients or customers.

This means that if you enter into a Civil Union in Illinois or get married and sign and record a new deed conveying the title of your house, which has to be your residence, to yourselves, as tenants by the entirety, the creditors of one of you cannot take away the house. This is asset protection in its greatest form. There are some rules, however, a creditor may tear down the tenancy by the entirety protection when the property is conveyed with the sole intent to avoid the payment of debts existing at the time of the transfer. There is no protection if both owners are liable to the creditor for the debt. And the protection only applies to vour main residence, homestead. and not to a vacation house or vacant real estate such as farmland. It is a common misconception, however, that joint tenancy is the best answer for all couples who want protection from all the problems that can arise when real estate is involved. There are many ways to purchase and hold title to real estate in order to achieve each couple's ownership and estate planning goals. As this subject involves considerable legal and tax consequences, one should first consult with their own attorney.

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

Ephemera of a Bygone World

Penelope, Queen of the Unicorns, and I were resting quietly in the shade of the orchard at the Horse Rescue. Seeing us from afar, you would not have guessed that we were engaged in a tense confrontation, which only ended when she confessed a painful truth: That the Species Unicorn and the Species Human had once enjoyed a close and sympathetic relationship, but regrettably, that warm and affectionate bond was now irreparably severed. The Queen struggled to explain the cause of our estrangement.

"Imagine, Holly, if you can," the Queen began, "a time many, many tens of thousands of years ago, a time when unicorns and humans lived peacefully together: Your species residing in small villages of tents made of animal hides, and my species living in the fields and forests surrounding your village.

"Now... this was a time before you humans had developed that technology we call 'writing.' Yes, your species had mastered an early form of mathematics, allowing you to tally up the game animals you observed, counting them: 'One, two, three, many.' But your species had not yet discovered writing, nor any alphabet, grammar, punctuation or pronouns. All knowledge possessed by your species existed solely in the minds and memory of those few humans then drawing breath.

"But, Holly, do not imagine that the

humans of that time were ignorant, crude or brutish. No! They were as clever and creative as you, today. Why, you have only to examine some of those ancient cave paintings – featuring horses, bison and other animals – to see how sophisticated your species was. Though those images do not constitute 'writing,' the skill and sensitivity of those ancient artists was more than enough to capture the unique personalities of those animals."

Penelope was warming to her subject. "Next, let us travel in our imagination to that ancient time and eavesdrop upon a gathering of the local humans and unicorns. We find them finished with their evening meal; their stomachs full, seated cozy around a fire, and not yet ready for bed.

"For many thousands of years, such gatherings were always the same: One or more humans (or unicorns) who had pleasant voices, who could carry a tune, would stand up and sing songs passed down to them. Then, perhaps, another (human or unicorn) would tell a funny story, followed by one of the young hunters recounting something exciting that had occurred during a recent hunt. And finally, sometimes, the 'unofficial storyteller' of the village would recount a stirring, dramatic scene featuring venerated hunters of the past, whom all the young men dreamed they might one day equal in bravery and skill.

"For many generations, if there were songs, it was because the singer had learned that song at her mother's knee. If there was humor, it was because those jokes and comic observations were 'common currency' among the cleverest. And if there was any saga of brave hunters and virtuous mothers, it was because the Storyteller kept in his memory the legendary deeds of their ancestors, and wove those stories into a never-ending narrative of danger, sacrifice and survival.

"Perhaps you are thinking, 'How tragic that those primitive humans and unicorns had to rely so much upon memory; and when that failed all else was improvised, unscripted and imagined. How tragic that their songs and stories could not be written down nor recorded anywhere except in the hearts and memories of those gathered around that fire.



"And, you might wonder, what impromptu 'Hamlets' were performed around those fires, by playwrights for whom all drama was spontaneous? How many 'Yesterdays' were first performed in a cappella harmony, beneath a sky that never yet knew light from any source but moon and stars and burning branches. All these things are but ephemera, lost to us today.

"Nevertheless, we can be sure that the close, familial bonds between those ancient artists and their audience ensured that no performer would repeat any song which his listeners did not find melodious. And no storyteller would waste his breath – nor keep in memory, nor pass down to his understudy – any story, characters or events which were judged unpleasant, rude or hateful.

"Those evening performances, lit only by fire, and wholly dependent upon the living voices of those ancient artists and storytellers, provided a sure guarantee against divisive, hurtful words which – had they been uttered aloud in the midst of such a comingtogether of souls – would have shamed both speaker and audience. Though the time of which we speak is impossibly remote from us today, we can be certain that anything... malicious or spiteful was not only not recorded, but was immediately erased from the memory of unicorns and

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CHICAGO HONORS PRIDE PARADE LEADER RICH PFEIFFER WITH DEDICATED STREET SIGN



The City of Chicago honored longtime Chicago Pride Parade coordinator *Richard Pfeiffer* with an honorary street sign—"Rich Pfeiffer Parade Way"—at the northwest corner of Belmont Avenue and North Halsted Street. The sign was unveiled during a dedication ceremony on Sunday, October 27, in tribute to Pfeiffer's lifelong work advocating for the LGBTQ+ community.

Pfeiffer, who led the Chicago Pride Parade from 1974 until his passing in 2019, was instrumental in transforming the parade into one of the oldest, largest, and most celebrated Pride events in the country.

"One of our earliest and longest-serving activists, Rich Pfeiffer made history through decades of dedicated and impactful service to our community," says *Art Johnston*, co-owner of Sidetrack and co-founder of Equality Illinois. "Under Rich's year-round leadership, the Chicago Pride Parade grew from a small gathering of a few hundred participants to a grand celebration with thousands of marchers and over a million viewers, reflecting the incredible growth of our community."

Pfeiffer passed away just months after successfully leading the Chicago Pride Parade in 2019, on the 50th anniversary of the 1969 Stonewall riots in New York City. His dedication to the community helped shape the parade into a landmark event.

"Richard's leadership and passion shaped the parade and our community for more than 45 years," said *Ron Thomas*, PRIDEChicago board member and parade cocoordinator. "This honorary street sign ensures that his legacy will be remembered by all who participate in or witness the parade."

Pfeiffer's legacy continues through PRIDEChicago, the allvolunteer organization he created



and led. In September of this year, the organization secured its 501(c) (3) nonprofit status and announced a Board of Directors, paving the way for expanded community initiatives.

"We are now positioned to ensure that the spirit of pride and progress endures for generations to come," said **Steve Long**, board chair and parade co-coordinator.

Pfeiffer's contributions to Chicago's LGBTQ+ community extended far beyond the parade. He was a founding member of the Committee on Gay/Lesbian Issues under Mayor HaroldWashington and was later reappointed to the Advisory Council on Gay and Lesbian Issues by Mayor Richard M. Daley. Pfeiffer was also inducted into the Chicago Lesbian and Gay Hall of Fame in 1993.

44th Ward Alderman **Bennett Lawson** and the Chicago Department of Transportation coordinated the street sign dedication with PRIDEChicago. The ceremony was attended by Pfeiffer's husband, **Tim Frye**, along with family, friends, elected officials, and community leaders.

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
