

Runyon Canyon, El Pueblo de Los Angeles, and the WeHo Bar Scene: Walking in L A (Your WeHo Car Free, Care Free Weekend)

I recently visited Southern California and had a fun time. The weather is always good, but the winter is the best coming from cloudy and cold climates like mine. I flew nonstop into LAX and survived without a rental car. It's a lot more relaxing. I stayed at the Ramada Plaza in West Hollywood (and the Renaissance LAX and the Anaheim Marriott). All three were excellent and affordable – increasingly important in this expensive region.

WHAT TO DO

Hike Runyon Canyon Park above Hollywood: This 160 acre park has a great three-mile loop trail. Enter from Fuller Road and go counterclockwise on the trails. Stunning views of the Pacific Ocean, downtown LA, the LA mountains to the east, and of course the famous Hollywood sign. Many movie stars and movie star wannabees can be found hiking the popular trail. Lots of interesting native vegetation (mostly scrub chapparal) plus native trees adopted to the Mediterranean climate (rain only in the winter, dry the rest of the year). Bring plenty of water. Parking is limited so take public transit (Sunset Boulevard route to Fuller). Vendors at the park entrance sell food and beverages

including a fruit mix.

Hit the West Hollywood bar scene:Revolver is the video bar (8851 Santa Monica) and is always hopping. Dancers on the weekends. The Gym (8919 Santa Monica) is extremely popular. Micky's has a great happy hour and also a taco bar where you can have a picnic. Hi Tops is the sports bar (there's another one in San Francisco) and is quite popular. The Abbey is a lot of fun. Schmitty's is also quite popular and features an upscale crowd.

Take your pick of bars – there is something for everyone and they are just steps from the Ramada Plaza on Santa Monica Boulevard.

Explore the El Pueblo de Los Angeles State Monument Park near Union Station:

It's the original spot where LA was founded in the 1700s. Learn about the history of this city which was previously under Spanish then Mexican rule. Enjoy the shops and restaurants in this Farmers Market like setting. Nearby is the art deco gem, Union Station, where you can catch Amtrak, Metrolink commuter rail, and the Metro subway/light rail lines. I went to LAX from Union Station on the A and C lines for just \$1.75. Hang out on the beach at Santa Monica Pier

Go to Anaheim Home of Disneyland. The Anaheim Packing District is the new food court. The Garden Walk features tons of restaurants. We liked Casa de Pancho Mexican. The Anaheim Marriott is nice.

WHERE TO STAY IN WEHO

You simply cannot beat the iconic Ramada Plaza on Santa Monica Boulevard. Next door to the Trader Joe's. Many great LGBTQ+ bars just down the street. A great gym across the street. On the #4 line to Santa Monica and to downtown. Very handy. Best of all no resort fee (aka amenity fee or destination fee) which the other hotels had (at \$35 a day plus tax) and no "Worker Protection Fee Ordinance Surcharge" (around \$20 a day plus tax). And what is this even for and why are both charges not in base rates? (The Ramada has a \$1 a day safe fee plus tax but they will take it off the bill if you balk). The Ramada Plaza is a Miami 1980s architectural gem. If you need a car, Enterprise is next door. The trendy gym is across the street. You can walk everywhere, and everything is just steps away.

HOW TO GET THERE

I took a non-stop (IND LAX) on American on the way out and another nonstop red eye on Delta on the way back. Both flights were flawless. Delta now has free WiFi!

I took the #3 Big Blue Bus to Santa Monica from LAX the next day for just \$1.10 and connected to the #4 bus to West Hollywood (\$1.75). Then I took the #4 bus to the red line subway to go to Union Station. Then I took the commuter rail, MetroLink, to go to Anaheim (close to Disneyland). The all day weekend pass is a deal. The new WeHo CityLine bus will also take you around town (*weho.org/cityline*). Car NOT needed.

WHERE AND WHAT TO EAT

Tail O' the Pup in West Hollywood is Southern California architecture at its finest. They also have good hot dogs.

I loved the many choices at the Original Farmers Market. Plus healthy juices. Try the enchiladas at Magee's (6333 W 3rd Street). The open air shopping and dining facility has been open since 1934.

I got quick meals too at the Trader Joes (8611 Santa Monica Boulevard).

The Angel City IPA is excellent



and is a local microbrew. I had one at LAX. The Asian Street Eats in the Tom Bradley Terminal has healthy bowls. Try the short ribs with purple rice and spicy Teriyaki.

You cannot go wrong in LA when eating. Even the gas station convenience stores have healthy items.

OTHER TIPS

You will see lots of movie stars and move star wanna bees. Everyone watches what they eat and eats healthy. I had a carrot/beet/ pineapple/apple red juice combo at the Yum Yum Donuts (5836 W. Manchester) near the Doubletree LAX. Only in California. And so healthy.

The LA Blade occasionally carries my column. There is no other in print publication I could find. However, **GEDMAG.com** (a Palm



Springs publication) has some LA stuff.

West Hollywood is celebrating its 40th anniversary as a city. It's very gay and not as retiree oriented as nearby Palm Springs. It's also very walkable.

More information and special thanks to *visitwesthollywood.com*.

While I flew into LAX, you may want to avoid it. Burbank, Ontario, Santa Ana, and Long Beach are less congested alternatives and easier to get to. If you must go into LAX like me (since that is where the nonstops went), take transit and avoid the car congestion.

Look out for the robot food carts in WeHo which deliver food. They are everywhere on the sidewalk. The Waymo driverless taxis are another hit.

Into the "Wild and Blue": An interview with gay writer Paul Lisicky

At 81 years old, all-around music legend Joni Mitchell may be more popular and famous now than at any other point in her long and productive career. Feted and honored at multiple music tributes, returning to the stage for limited live performances, showered with glowing praise from a plethora of sources and the subject of an abundance of new books, including "Song So Wild and Blue" (Harper One, 2025) by gay writer Paul Lisicky. Subtitled "A Life with the Music of Joni Mitchell," Lisicky's memoir interweaves Mitchell music references and life events with his own experiences, illustrating her impact on his personal and creative lives. Paul was kind enough to make time for an interview in advance of his book's February 2025 publication date.

Gregg Shapiro: Forgive me, Paul, but I want to begin with the most obvious question – your book "Song So Wild and Blue" – arrives a few months after Ann Powers' book "Traveling: On the Path of Joni Mitchell," and in the same month as Henry Alford's "I Dream of Joni." Would you please say something about the Joni zeitgeist and the proximity of these books? Paul Lisicky: The concept of the zeitgeist is funny to apply to Joni, in that most of her albums were written against the times, with the exception of "Court and Spark." Folk music was long out of fashion by the time of her first three albums. "Blue" wasn't recognized as the masterpiece it is until many years later, and so many of her albums from "The Hissing of Summer Lawns" onward were met with indifference if not disdain. Throughout the late 1970s into the 1980s, she was thought to be irrelevant. The culture has been late

to recognize her accomplishment. I just read that 68 books were published about Leonard Cohen between 2014 and 2021: 19 in 2014 and 2015 alone, the year of his eightieth birthday. We're just catching up with Joni.

It's interesting to me that the three books you mention all had to be underway before her 2022 appearance at the Newport Folk Festival. I don't think anybody ever expected Joni to perform again after her brain aneurysm in 2015. It's common knowledge that she had to learn how to walk, talk, and sing again, and her comeback in her early 80s hamagnetic; how many times does an audience get to see a fullon resurrection? There are plenty more books to come and the thought of that makes me very happy.

GS: Were you aware of Ann's and Henry's books while writing yours?

PL: No, not at all. I learned about Ann's book after I'd turned mine in, the Henry Alford book this past September. They're all radically different projects and I was never concerned about overlap. Ann's is as much about the complexities of being a music critic as it is a Joni biography. Henry Alford's is a collection of short essays prompted by 53 photographs of Joni. My book documents Joni's influence on my creative life, all the ways I've internalized the lessons in those songs, from youth till now. It's also interested in thinking about her music from the perspective of a gay man, through an LGBTQ+ frame. That hasn't been much written about.

GS: In the opening section, "Down To You," you wrote, "Every writer



should begin with another art form – acting painting, sculpture – and use that as a point of comparison or departure." Did your beginnings as a musician influence that train of thought?

PL: Oh, definitely. My work as a musician informs everything I write, whether it's the shape of a sentence, a tonal shift, the pacing, the heightening of an image, or a word. A good song penetrates on multiple levels. It does something to our neural circuitry – it changes us. So how to bring that to the page? That's been the challenge.

GS: In the "Stay In Touch" section, you wrote, "The transition from songwriting to fiction: Deep down under my skin, I knew it wasn't as far as it seemed." Does that mean that you feel that your songwriting and performing past prepared you for your life as a writer, one who does readings of his work? PL: Giving a reading and singing before an audience has always felt like an identical experience to me. My own lost life comes fully back to me when I'm standing at a microphone, reading from my work. I think singers get to move their bodies more, but I'm probably doing that in my imagination [laughs]!

GS: Your partner Jude brackets the book, written about extensively in the first and final sections. How does he feel about

being in the book?

PL: Jude came into my life just as the book was underway, and it's as much a love letter to him as it is to Joni. He was by my side through all of it. He listened to me think about it, read early and late drafts, and offered suggestions on both a global and line level. He's a brilliant reader and editor, has such good instincts about structure and cutting, and challenged me to push the book in more adventurous directions. But as to your question, I think you'd need to ask him.

GS: I love that you love Laura Nyro, too. More than any of the other Laurel Canyon women, I see more connection between Joni and Laura than the rest. Would you agree?

PL: Joni and Laura definitely took direction from each other - they were mutual fans; more collaborative than competitive. You can hear Laura in the piano songs on "Blue," especially the title song, as well as in mid to later songs like "Paprika Plains," "Last Chance Lost," "Man from Mars," and "Strong and Wrong," And I can feel Joni's influence all over Laura's albums from "Smile" through "Mother's Spiritual." That shared fascination with unorthodox piano chords, art song, and a classical influence pulled up through the twentieth century into pop music. Not to mention a kind of unrestricted, feral emotion. Somewhere out there is a areat photo of the two of them in conversation, cigarettes between their fingers, looking at each other with mischief and interest.

GS: Does your childhood friend Albert, about whom you wrote in the "Sweet Bird" section know he's in the book?

PL: Albert died back in 1996, alas. If he were still around, I can imagine the two of us talking about that passage, him saying, "Aww, look at us." From a distance of decades, it's clear that all the complexities of our friendship/relationship were brought on by the homophobia of the times and all the ways we'd taken that rebuke into ourselves.

GS: When you write about writing, in the Iowa chapter and the "Black Crow" sections, for example, your teacher voice comes through.


Would you consider parts of "Sonas So Wild and Blue" to he a cautionary tale for young writers? PL: I hadn't thought of it in that way, but that makes sense. My greater hope is that those sections inspire younger writers when it comes to the hard work of shaping a vision, a sound, a voice. That never happens in isolation, but in conversation with other voices. in community. As to the challenges of cultivating an audience? I think a number of mv students are alreadv prettv savvy about a lot of that after having grown up with the thorns of social media.

GS: While I was reading your book, the latest book in the 33 1/3 series – Kate Bush's "Hounds of Love" – was delivered. Joni's "Court and Spark" is #40 of 188 titles. If you could write about a Joni album for the series, which would it be?

PL: I know I'm cheating, but it would be a toss-up between "For the Roses" and "Hejira." But to be honest, I've been listening a lot to the later albums and I think I might learn more from getting deep into "Night Ride Home" or "Turbulent Indigo."

GS: Have you seen the Kathy Bates interview in which she talks about her friendship with Joni?

PL: I first knew of that story through Taylor Goldsmith, but it was great to hear the story in Kathy Bates' own voice. In short, Kathy Bates handed Joni her old guitar at one of the Joni Jams at her house. Joni started retuning it, and that was the mythic




moment in which Joni came back to performing her songs. The hilarious thing – and this I hadn't heard before – is that Kathy Bates now wants her old guitar back [laughs]. Not sure if Joni has any idea!

GS: At the time this interview is taking place, the movie A Complete Unknown, starring Timothee Chalamet as Bob Dylan is getting a lot of attention. Who do you think would be the perfect actor to play young Joni in a biopic?

PL: Ah, great question! It's already known that Meryl Streep is set to play the older Joni in the Cameron Crowe-directed movie coming out later this year. But the younger Joni has to be an unknown, and I'm betting the role might be career-defining.

GS: Have you started thinking about or writing your next book? PL: Yes, I'm always working on something. I've been writing it since fall 2023 and it keeps changing shape as books do along the way.

The Stars are Bright, Fernando Fernando Shines in Exteriors, the captivating LGBTQ film by director Mark Schwab

Fernando grew up with dreams of making a difference. While he first aspired to become the U.S. president, his realization that this dream wasn't possible due to his being born in Costa Rica led him to pursue a different path of influence: acting. After graduating high school, Fernando made his way to Los Angeles, where he quickly landed a role on Disney Channel's Disney 365. It was a "dream come true" that shaped his career and life. Now, Fernando takes center stage in Exteriors, an LGBTQ film by director Mark Schwab that weaves together three interconnected stories of modern gay relationships. The film premieres in March on GayBingeTV. Fernando explains more from his Los Angeles home.

Paul Hutnick:You're best known from your time on Disney Channel's Disney 365. Is it true it almost didn't happen?

Fernando: Yes! The morning of my big audition, the power went out in my building and the gate of my garage wouldn't open! I was panicking: sweating bullets, crying. This was the biggest audition of my life, and I couldn't get out of my building! Thankfully the casting director was so patient and understanding. I finally got to the audition, an hour late. I left thinking I would never hear from them but I got a callback that I completely flubbed because I was a ball of nerves. I left the callback thinking, not a chance in hell, but three days later I got the call telling me I booked it!

P.H:Did Disney 365 help shape your journey as an actor?

Fernando: The lessons I learned from that time have shaped everything I do in and out of acting.

P.H: What does a typical day in your life look like now?

Fernando: I don't think there's such a thing as a typical day for an artist. For that reason, I strive to stick to my self-care regimens religiously. First thing every morning, I stretch for thirty minutes to an hour and then hit the gym. Whatever happens from that point on in the day is that day's adventure.

P.H: What initially attracted you to the role of Kenny, and in what ways do you relate to him

personally?

Fernando: Kenny and I are similar in that we care about our friendships and relationships more than anything else.

P.H: You previously portrayed Kenny in Brotherly Lies. How did it feel to revisit this character in a new context with Exteriors? *Fernando:* Amazing! It's rare to be given the chance to step back into a role, and I felt lucky to do so. Especially with Mark (Schwab, the film's director) and his crew.

P.H: Exteriors delves into the idea of whether coincidences are random or part of a greater plan. What are your personal thoughts? Ferenando: There have been countless times where I'm thinking of someone so I reach out or bump into them and they say, "I was just thinking of you." How is it that we both were thinking of each other? That, to me, proves we're all interconnected in ways we don't yet understand. I believe there's something bigger at play. P.H: What do you hope audiences both LGBTQ+ and beyond—take away from Exteriors?

Fernando: I hope audiences leave the experience more open to whatever "randomness" life throws at us. We can all learn something meaningful from seemingly insignificant moments. You never know what that moment might mean eight years from now.

P.H: Would you suggest that

viewers watch Brotherly Lies before diving into Exteriors? *Fernando:* I definitely think it's an added bonus, but both films stand on their own.

P.H: In your opinion, how has the representation of LGBTQ+ characters and stories in film evolved over time? *Fernando:* How much time do you have? Long answer short; it's come a long way but still has a long way to go.


P.H: How does working on a gay film compare to other projects you've been involved in? Fernando: Brotherly Lies was my first time working on a queer project and I found it to be pure magic. It's what little me never knew I wanted to do. It gave me a chance to speak from my actual lived experiences and forced me to be honest with myself in the storytelling in ways I had never been challenged to do before.

P.H: What advice would you give to aspiring actors, particularly LGBTQ+ individuals, who want to break into the film industry? *Fernando:* This is a hard one as after eleven years doing this professionally, I'm trying to figure it out myself. However, there are things that still remain true. Train. Learn. Study the craft, but also equip yourself with knowledge of how to navigate being your own business.


P.H: What's next on the horizon for you?

Fernando: My new film *CUTAWAYS* will be coming out soon which I'm really excited for. I got to have blue hair which is something I always wanted to try! Aside from that, I am working towards a law degree and will be doing a pre law fellowship in Europe this summer. I've never been, and it's wildly expensive so I've started a crowdfunding campaign on my social media @spacemoneky.






Q-Music: ICYMI

With so much music being released on a daily basis, it's easy to understand how some albums can be overlooked. Here are some from 2024 that you might have missed.

Listening to **Father John Misty** (aka Josh Tillman) can be a religious experience (even for an atheist like me), especially when it comes to his brilliant album "Mahashmashana" (Sub Pop). The title is a reference to a Sanskrit word that means "great burial ground," and yet this is some of the most vibrant music you are likely to hear. Beginning with the near-epic (almost



10-minute) title track, with its mention of "the corpse dance," Father John Misty once again showcases his affection for lushly orchestrated pop music with a retro bent. Just don't get too cozy, because he slams us against the wall in "She Cleans Up." But that kind of sonic shift is temporary because he continues to pour on the disturbing beauty in "Mental Health," "Being You," and the Sinatraesque "Summer's Gone." However, FJM comes closest to nirvana on "I **Guess Time Just Makes** Fools of Us All," an 8.5minute scoop of vintage disco that should be spun in gay clubs far and wide.


A similar retro vibe permeates "Here In The Pitch" (Mexican Summer) by Jessica Pratt. Some queer listeners may have first become aware of Pratt via gay singer/songwriter Troye Sivan's song "Can't Go Back, Baby" on which he samples her song "Back, Baby" from her 2015 "On Your Own Love Again" album. As haunting as it is gorgeous, listening to the nine songs on "Here In The Pitch" is a little like entering a musical time machine. The arrangements are from an earlier era but still manage to feel fresh and captivating. It also helps that Pratt doesn't sound like anyone else currently recording, which provides the songs with a distinctive personality. Standout tracks include "Better Hate," "Empires Never Know," "Nowhere It Was," "The Last Year," and "By Hook or By Crook."

Nashville-based ally Mindy Smith (who has a performance at an HRC benefit on her resume) is back with "Quiet Town" (Compass), the Americana singer/songwriter's first album in more than a dozen years. Cited by Kacey Musgraves as an influence (something you can certainly hear). Smith at long last returns with one of the most powerful albums of her career. The breathtaking "I'd Rather Be a Bridge," described as "a plea for compassion and connection" deserves to become an anthem during these troubled times. Other notable numbers include "Peace Eludes Me," the old-time country of "Farther Than We Should Have." and the title cut. [Mindy Smith performs on January 30 at City Winery Chicago.]

If all you know of legendary percussionist **Sheila E**. is related to the time she spent in Prince's orbit, then you only know a fraction of the story. A sought-after musician in her own right, she has released several albums, including her latest "Bailar" (Sony Music Latin/ Stilettoflats). Featuring guest artists Gloria Estefan and Mimy Succar ("Bemba Colora"), Rubén Blades ("Anacaona"), Debi Nova ("Possibilities"), as well as her parents Pete "Pops" Escovedo and Juanita "Moms" Escovedo, Sheila E. makes a long overdue return to form.



Avoiding Financial Grief

Imagine, for a moment, the unthinkable: You're in a car wreck or have a heart attack and suddenly you are in the hospital for a long time. Who pays the mortgage, who makes the car payment? Who cashes your paychecks or makes insurance claims? Who manages your investments?

If you assume that your partner, lover or married spouse could automatically manage everything for you, think again. Your spouse does not have the legal authority to act on your behalf. If bank accounts, stocks or mutual funds are in one person's name alone, his or her hands will be tied.

And your spouse may be restricted even if property is owned in both of your names. For example, if title of your house in held in both of your names, your spouse can't sell it unless both of you sign the papers.

The way around this potential nightmare is a simple document called a durable power of attorney.

SUICIDE WARNING

With this legal document, you appoint a specific person to manage your finances if you become incapacitated or incompetent. Generally, this person would be able to write checks from your accounts, pay your taxes, sell stocks and bonds and handle real estate transactions and other financial matters.

Without such written authority the non-disabled spouse would be powerless to help his or her disabled spouse with banking problems, real estate snafus or representing their disabled spouse in applying for insurance, unemployment or social security benefits.

And if family members tried to take over control of the bank accounts and property of their disabled (non-married) child, the non-disabled partner would only be able to stand by and watch, especially painful if it involved property and money the couple owned together.

The Illinois State Legislature has enacted a law entitled the "Illinois Power of Attorney Act" which

formerly recognizes the right of an individual (principal) to delegate personal and financial decision making power to an "agent" - a LGBT spouse, lover or partner. The law ensures the right of LGBT couples to have their spouse's powers to be the same as their own to control all aspects of personal financial matters throughout their lifetime, including periods of disability, and to continue until their death unless revoked.

The law anticipates that by using a standardized form an individual will be assured that his or her agent's authority will be honored by third parties with whom the agent deals, regardless of the mental condition of the principal



when the power is used.

Although the process of designating someone as your agent has been simplified by the use of standardized forms the power you are granting is enormous and can have sever consequences if abused. The decision to grant anyone such extensive power should only be made after first consulting with your attorney to understand the consequences and protections against abuse the law provides.

You may wish to have your attorney modify the "standardized" form to include additional protections against abuse of the power by providing that the power of attorney can only take effect upon the incompetence of the maker (this is called a "springing" power of attorney because it springs into effect only when the maker becomes incapacitated) as determined by the physician designated in the power.

The power would then start when the non-disabled spouse receives a letter from the doctor stating that the maker of the power of attorney is unable to handle ordinary business matters. Be aware that state laws vary. If you live in Chicago but spend your winters in Florida or Palm Springs, make sure that your durable power of attorney is acceptable in both states. You may have to draw up a second set for Florida. Also, make sure your document is considered acceptable by the financial institutions you use. Some banks only recognize their own forms.



GRAB A BOOK

"Murder in the Dressing Room" by Holly Stars c.2025, Berkeley \$19.00 368 pages



Your alter-ego, the other half of your double life, is a superhero. When you're quiet, she's boisterous. Your confidence is flat, hers soars. She's a better dresser than you are, she's more popular, and maybe even a little smarter. By day, you live a normal existence but by night, your other side roars and in the new mystery, "Murder in the Dressing Room" by Holly Stars, both of you solve crimes.

Lady Lady had been a little off all evening.

As owner of London's most fabulous, elegant drag club, she was usually in command but her protegee, Misty Devine, could tell that something was wrong.

She discovered how wrong when she found Lady Lady on her dressing room floor, foaming at the mouth, dead, poisoned by a mysterious box of chocolates.

Hours later, Misty de-dragged, morphing from an elegant woman to an ordinary, binary hotel employee named Joe who was heartbroken by the tragedy. Only employees had access to Lady Lady's dressing room – ergo, someone they knew at the club had to be the killer!

Obviously, the London detectives assigned to the case had a suspect list, but Misty/Joe and their boyfriend Miles knew solving Lady Lady's murder was really up to them. They knew who the killer wasn't... but who it was, well, who had reason to kill Misty's mentor?

Maybe Mandy, the club's co-owner. The club's bartender and bouncer were both sketchy. Lady Lady had spats with two employees and a former coworker, but was that motive enough? When the dress Lady Lady was wearing that night proved to have been valuable stolen goods, Joe's investigation list grew to include people who might have sneaked backstage when no one was paying attention, and a shady man who was suddenly following them around. Then Misty learned that she was in Lady Lady's will, and she figured the inheritance would be minor but she got a huge surprise. Lady Lady's posthumous gift could make others think that Misty might've had reason to kill her!

And just like that, the suspect list gained another entry...

When you first get "Murder in the Dressing Room" in your hands, hang onto it tight. It's fun, and so fluffy and light that it might float away if you're not careful.

The story's a little too long, as well, but there's enjoyment to be had here, and authenticity enough to hold a reader's attention. Author Holly Stars is a drag performer in London and somewhat of a murder maven there, which gives her insight into books of this genre and the ability to string readers along nicely with solid characters. If you're unfamiliar with the world of drag you'll also learn a thing or two while you're sleuthing through the story; drag queens and kings will like the dual tale, and the settings that anchor it. As a mystery, this is fun and different, exciting, but tame enough for any adult reader. If you love whodunits and you want something light, "Murder in the Dressing Room" is a double delight.

"When the Band Played On: The Life of Randy Shilts, America's Trailblazing Gay Journalist" by Michael G. Lee c.2025, Chicago Review Press \$30.00 282 pages



You spent most of your early career playing second fiddle.

But now you've got the baton, and a story to tell that people aren't going to want to hear, though it's essential that they face the music. They must know what's happening. As in the new book "When the Band Played On" by Michael G. Lee, this time, it's personal.

Born in 1951 in small-town lowa, Randy Shilts was his alcoholic, abusive mother's third of six sons. Frustrated, drunk, she reportedly beat Shilts almost daily when he was young; she also called him a "sissy," which "seemed to follow Randy everywhere." Perhaps because of the abuse,

Shilts had to "teach himself social graces," developing "adultlike impassiveness" and "biting sarcasm," traits that featured strongly as he matured and became a writer. He was exploring his sexuality then, learning "the subtleties of sexual communication," while sleeping with women before fully coming out as gay to friends.

Nearing his twenty-first birthday, Shilts moved to Oregon to attend college and to "allow myself love." There, he became somewhat of an activist before leaving San Francisco to fully pursue journalism, focusing on stories of gay life that were "mostly unknown to anyone outside of gay culture."

He would bounce between Oregon and California several times, though he never lost sight of his writing career and, through it, his activism. In both states, Shilts reported on gay life, until he was well-known to national readers and gay influencers. After San Francisco supervisor Harvey Milk was assassinated, he was tapped to write Milk's biography.

By 1982, Shilts was in love, had a book under his belt, a radio gig, and a regular byline in a national publication reporting "on the GRID beat," an acronym later changed to AIDS. He was even under contract to write a second book.

But Shilts was careless. Just once, careless.

"In hindsight," says Lee, "... it was likely the night when Randy crossed the line, becoming more a part of the pandemic than just another worried bystander."

Perhaps not surprisingly, there are two distinct audiences for "When the Band Played On." One type of reader will remember the AIDS crisis and the seminal book about it. The other is too young to remember it, but needs to know Randy Shilts' place in its history.

The journey may be different, the result is the same: author Michael G. Lee tells a complicated, stillcontroversial story of Shilts and the book that made America pay attention, and it's edgy for modern eyes. Lee clearly shows why Shilts had fans and haters, why Shilts was who he was, and Lee keeps some mystery in the tale: Shilts had the knowledge to keep himself safe but he apparently didn't, and readers are left to wonder why. There's uncomfortable tension in that, and a lot of hypothetical thinking to be had.

For scholars of gay history, this is an essential book to read. Also, for anyone too young to remember AIDS as it was, "When the Band Played On" hits the right note.
